2004/05 Budget Funds New Library, Park, and More!



The Board of County Commissioners approved its 2004-05 budget in September following two public hearings. The \$191 million dollar spending plan includes a reduction in the general millage rate while providing funding to continue high levels of services to Leon County

citizens. The budget includes funds for the Lake Jackson Branch Library, the Northeast Community Park, the Apalachee Parkway Regional Park at the Solid Waste Facility (landfill), and funding toward the development of a women's health center on the Southside of the County. In addition, there is funding for road construction, stormwater improvements, economic development enhancements, and more.
