It has been one year since Leon County government launched a new County-run Emergency Medical Services (EMS) department. Since its inception, Leon County EMS has responded to more than 22,000 emergencies and impacted thousands of lives. Leon



County EMS is providing the highest quality EMS care available, featuring highly skilled and trained medics with state-of-the-art equipment and technology. In addition, through a County-City partnership, medics and firefighters are better coordinated in emergency response than ever before.

One of the most significant improvements under the new system is the rapid response time. Since Leon County took over this service, the amount of time it takes for an ambulance to get to you in an emergency has been significantly reduced, and the quality of the care you receive is better. Leon County has expanded coverage with ambulances posted throughout the County, and LCEMS operates under a model that moves ambulances where and when they're needed most.

LCEMS is being pro-active in becoming an integral part of the community by providing emergency care response services, special services, and educational opportunities to Leon County schools, churches and civic groups. LCEMS continues to provide more than 100 hours per month of special services and ambulance stand-by.

Board of County Commissioners Selects 2004/05 Priorities

The Board of County Commissioners held its annual retreat on Dec. 13 to determine its 2004/05 Priorities. The commissioners decided to continue many of their priorities from 2003/04, but also brought three new issues to the forefront.

The top priorities for Leon County this year are: 1. Enhance Economic Development - Work with the Economic Development Council and local Chambers of Commerce to address job creation, loss of state jobs, and acquisition of state buildings to enhance private sector development.



2. Address Leon County Jail Issues - Address inmate overcrowding, inmate health care and medical issues, availability including of prescription drugs, mental health issues. vocational training for inmates, and assess adequate staffing levels of correctional officers.

3. Improve Health Care Address Insurance accessibility and affordability of health care for Leon County citizens.
