

Title: Workshop on the 2025 State and Federal Legislative Priorities

Statement of Issue:

This workshop item seeks the Board's approval of recommended state and federal legislative priorities for the 2025 Florida Legislative Session and the first session of the 119th Congress. In addition, as requested by the Board, this item provides a comparative analysis of state appropriations among like-sized counties, the use of contract lobbying services, and provides options to secure additional lobbying services for appropriations for Board consideration.

Fiscal Impact:

This item has no fiscal impact. However, it recommends requests for state and federal appropriations as well as substantive policy positions that seek to avoid unfunded mandates and cost shifts to the County. Should the Board provide direction to procure additional lobbying services for the 2025 State Legislative Session, a Budget Amendment in an amount determined by the Board would be included in the ratification item to allocate resources from the General Fund contingency account.

Staff Recommendations:

- Option #1: Approve the 2025 State and Federal Legislative Priorities
- Option #2: Provide any additional Board direction on the County's 2025 State and Federal Legislative Priorities or the state and federal contract lobbyists.

Report and Discussion

Background:

Each year, the Board conducts a workshop with the County's legislative staff and contract lobbyists to develop priorities for the upcoming state and federal legislative sessions. This workshop enables the County's legislative team to receive important guidance from the Board regarding priority legislative issues and directs the County's lobbying efforts for the upcoming year at both the state and federal level.

In addition, on September 17, 2024, the Board requested an update on the County's state lobbying services and an analysis of like-sized counties securing state appropriations and use of contract lobbying services. At that time, the Board also requested for this workshop item to include an option to issue a Request for Proposals (RFP) for supplemental lobbying services specifically focused on securing appropriations during the upcoming state legislative session. Accordingly, this item provides the comparative analysis requested by the Board and options to secure additional lobbying services through the RFP process for Board consideration.

Leon County utilizes contract lobbying services at the state and federal levels to further the County's legislative goals and in pursuit of appropriations for key local projects. The Capitol Alliance Group has been under contract for state lobbying services since 2008 and Squire Patton Boggs has been under contract for federal lobbying services since 2002. The County's contract lobbying firms provide support by advocating for the County's legislative priorities at the state and federal levels. The practice of retaining contract lobbyists is common among local governments to advance legislative priorities and to mitigate or defeat harmful legislation.

At the June 8, 2021 meeting, in lieu of a Request for Proposals (RFP), the Board elected to enter into a new five-year contract with Capitol Alliance Group and Squire Patton Boggs (Attachment #1 and #2). Both contracts provided for a base term of three years with two one-year extensions. At that time, the Board proposed and approved increasing the County's contracted rate with Capitol Alliance Group from \$70,000 to \$85,000 for the purposes of increasing the MWBE subcontractor participation in the contract. The contract with Squire Patton Boggs is for \$100,000.

This workshop item provides recommended policy and appropriations priorities for the 2025 state and federal legislative sessions. Following the state and federal legislative priorities sections of this item is a comparative analysis section beginning on page 21 which focuses on contract lobbying services as well as state appropriations secured among like-sized counties. As requested by the Board, this workshop item provides options to secure additional contract lobbying services, including the issuance of an RFP for appropriations specific work for the 2025 State Legislative Session, as well as other options the Board may wish to consider.

Analysis:

The 2025 Florida Legislative Session will be held from March 4 through May 2, 2025, with interim committee weeks taking place from December 2024 through February 2025. The first session of the 119th U.S. Congress will convene during the first week of January 2025. This workshop item recommends several policy and appropriations priorities for the 2025 state and federal legislative sessions, arranged as follows:

- Proposed state and federal projects for legislative line-item and agency appropriation requests;
- State-level legislative policy priorities, including support of the FAC 2025 Legislative Priorities, for the 2025 Florida Legislative Session; and
- Federal legislative policy priorities, including support of the NACo 2025 Legislative Priorities, for the first session of the 119th United States Congress.

Like most legislation, Leon County’s legislative priorities are generally incremental in nature, focusing on issues specific to Leon County that are built upon over the course of several legislative sessions. Additionally, staff annually evaluates the trends and issues affecting all County programs and services to identify potential legislative priorities for the Board’s consideration. In recent years, the Board has directed staff to refine the County’s substantive policy priorities only to the most pressing issues and to support the Florida Association of Counties (FAC) and National Association of Counties (NACo) in achieving their respective legislative goals. Consistent with this direction, staff is seeking Board approval of the County’s 2025 State and Federal Legislative Priorities, comprised of the state and federal policy and appropriations issues proposed herein.

The Board may wish to add, remove, and/or amend legislative priorities as deemed appropriate for the County’s 2025 state and federal legislative priorities. Upon Board approval, the County’s legislative team will continue to engage the local delegation members on the County’s projects and policy priorities in preparation of and throughout the upcoming session. As always, staff will keep the Board fully apprised of legislative issues through agenda items and weekly updates during the 2025 legislative session.

PROPOSED 2025 STATE AND FEDERAL FUNDING REQUESTS

During each annual Legislative Priorities Workshop, the Board considers and approves a list of County projects to seek line-item funding from the state and federal governments for local projects, as well as projects to seek funding for though state and federal agency appropriations and grant programs. The County’s legislative team works throughout the year in coordination with County departments to identify projects for state and federal funding requests by reviewing the readiness of Board-approved projects in the County and Blueprint Capital Improvement Programs as well as opportunities to advance the Board-approved priorities and initiatives in the County’s Strategic Plan. The following provides an overview of how the County seeks funding for Board-approved projects through the state and federal line-item and agency appropriations/grants processes.

State Legislative Line-Items and Congressional Earmarks

Prior to the start of the annual State Legislative Session, the House and Senate release local project funding request forms to be completed by local governments, non-profit organization, or private

entities for the submission of funding requests. These forms require specific project information for each local project funding request including the scope of the project, the matching funds available, the current project phase, estimated completion date, and project ownership/management. The County's legislative team submits forms for each of the County's local project requests to the County's Legislative Delegation members for sponsorship during the upcoming session. The state appropriations process is highly competitive and Legislators receive and consider many funding requests from their legislative districts which may include several counties, cities, or communities. To best position the County to secure competitive state funding, many of the local project requests include a one-to-one local match and are "shovel-ready," meaning that design and permitting for projects (if applicable) have already been completed.

As the Legislature develops the annual State budget and balances its program needs and priorities, funding for local project requests may be included in the State budget as line-item appropriations. Line-item appropriations for local project requests specify the project name and funding to be provided by the State, subject to review by the Governor. Unlike the President of the United States, the Governor of Florida has line-item veto authority meaning that the Governor can reject any line-item funding included in the budget adopted by the Legislature.

At the federal level, "Community Project Funding Requests" (commonly known as "earmarks") may be submitted by Congressional members for consideration during the federal appropriation process. Similar to the state process, these are funding requests for direct, line-item appropriations in the federal budget. In past years, details regarding project eligibility for these funding requests have been released in early Spring and Congressional members have been limited to 15 requests for consideration. In light of the project request limit per member and competing interests within member districts, the County's legislative team works quickly to identify Leon County projects approved by the Board for inclusion in the County's legislative priorities which meet the eligibility criteria and coordinate funding requests with the County's federal delegation members.

State and Federal Agency Appropriations and Grants

In addition to line-item funding and earmarks for local project requests sponsored by state and federal delegation members, the state and federal budgets also provide funding directly to counties to be administered through state and federal agency appropriations and grant programs. Overall, the County leverages the most of its state and federal funding through agency appropriations. In addition, to ensure the County maximizes grant leveraging opportunities, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) coordinates with department liaisons and actively seeks competitive grant funding opportunities throughout the year. The County has been successful in recent years securing funding through many of these programs, particularly for major infrastructure projects. On average, the County secures approximately \$60 million through state and federal agency appropriations and grant programs on an annual basis, excluding of the additional COVID-19 relief funds in recent years. Most recently, in FY 2024, the County secured over \$56 million through over 50 state and federal agency appropriations and grant programs in FY 2024.

In preparation of the 2025 State Legislative Session, in August 2024, the Legislature's Office of Economic and Demographic Research (EDR) produced updated revenue estimates for the State's 2024-2025 FY. EDR generates estimates of state revenue sources periodically throughout the year

which are used by the Florida Legislature in the process of building its annual budget. In the August EDR report, state economists increased the amount of general revenue the State is projected to collect in the current 2024-2025 FY by \$943 million compared to earlier estimates, and also increased the projection for the 2025-2026 year by \$1.1 billion. The largest component of this projected increase is from the state’s earnings on investments followed by an increase in the state’s sales tax collections, reflecting continued inflationary impacts, which drives up prices and, as a result, sales tax revenues. Accordingly, the August EDR report estimated that the Legislature will have approximately \$2 billion in additional general revenue as it develops its FY 2025-2026 State Budget next session. However, recognizing that this forecast was developed prior to the catastrophic damage caused by Hurricane Helene and Milton, the August EDR report does not account for the hurricane-related recovery and insurance costs to be incurred by the state in the upcoming budget. The EDR is expected to release a revised general revenue forecast early next year prior to the start of the 2025 Legislative Session.

In recent years, the Florida Legislature and Governor DeSantis have placed a great emphasis on providing state funding to governments through the state agency appropriations process for infrastructure projects. Looking ahead, recognizing the limited funding available for local projects through the line-item appropriation process, Part A of Table #1 reflects a concise, targeted set of County projects to pursue line-item local project funding through the State’s budget which best align with the anticipated priorities of the Legislature during the 2025 session. In addition, the County’s legislative team will utilize this list to identify County projects which meet the eligibility criteria for future federal earmark requests in coordination with the County’s federal delegation. In addition to the projects seeking line-item funding, Part B of Table #1 also proposes specific County project funding requests to pursue funding through state and federal agency appropriations and grant programs. It should be noted that in addition to the projects identified under Part B of Table #1, the County will continue to actively identify additional projects to pursue funding through competitive regional, state, or federal agency grant programs throughout the year as applicable.

**PROPOSED POLICY REQUESTS
2025 STATE LEGISLATIVE SESSION**

Like most legislation, Leon County's policy requests are generally incremental in nature, focusing on issues specific to Leon County that are built upon over the course of several legislative sessions. Additionally, staff annually evaluates the trends and issues affecting all County programs and services to identify potential legislative policy priorities for the Board's consideration. Statewide significant substantive issues range from maintaining the County's home rule authority to the

State's current fiscal challenges and efforts to further reduce the size and scope of state government.

Leon County's lobbying team will monitor the budgetary and programmatic decisions made by the Legislature to determine their impact, if any, on local governments in the form of cost shifts or unfunded mandates. In addition to the substantive policy issues specific to Leon County, much of the County's legislative advocacy each session is focused on issues of statewide importance in conjunction with FAC. FAC will finalize its 2025 legislative program during its upcoming Legislative Conference, which will take place December 4 – 6, 2024, in Hillsborough County. The statewide issues identified by the FAC membership will assist staff in identifying the most critical issues facing counties during the state legislative session.

Following is a listing of the proposed Leon County 2025 state legislative policy priorities. A brief overview of each issue is provided that includes the specific recommended legislative action. In addition, the Board may wish to add, remove, and/or amend the proposed state legislative priorities as deemed appropriate.

Protection of the State Workforce

Issue: Recognizing that the state employees who live in Leon County are vital to our community, economy, and diversity, protecting the jobs of these workers from privatization, and advocating for fair wages has continuously been a top priority of the Board during the legislative cycle. This is an issue also strongly supported by members of Leon County's Legislative Delegation.

During the 2024 session, the Legislature included funding in the state budget to provide a 3% across-the-board salary increase for all state employees. This pay increase became effective as of July 1, 2024. In addition, the FY 2025 state budget also provided one-time salary enhancements for the recruitment and retention of employees with the Agency for Health Care Administration, the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, and the Department of Law Enforcement. Staff will continue to monitor for any legislation affecting state employee pay and benefits and will advocate on behalf of policies that benefit state employees during the 2025 session. Furthermore, should the State experience a revenue surplus and seek to enhance Florida Retirement System benefits, the County would encourage the Legislature to offset any fiscal impacts for disproportionately affected counties.

Action: Support the protection of the state workforce and oppose any reductions to state employee benefits.

Establish Florida's Emancipation Day as a State Holiday

Issue: Emancipation Day in Florida is traditionally celebrated on May 20th to recognize the emancipation of African-American slaves. The Emancipation Proclamation was issued by President Abraham Lincoln on January 1, 1863; however, it was more than two years later at the end of the Civil War, on May 10, 1865, that Union Brigadier General Edward M. McCook arrived in Tallahassee to take possession of

the city from Southern forces. On May 20, 1865, after official control of the region was transferred to Union forces, General McCook declared the Emancipation Proclamation in effect. At the September 29, 2020 meeting, the Board approved a resolution of support for establishing May 20th, Florida's Emancipation Day, as a state holiday in celebration of the past, present, and future of Black economic liberation and those who work toward that liberation.

During the 2021 Legislative Session, SB 490 was filed which would have designated Juneteenth Day (June 19) as a legal and paid holiday for employees of all branches and agencies of state government. The Senate bill was later laid on the table and replaced by HB 1553, which was amended by the Senate to establish Juneteenth Day and Florida's Emancipation Day as legal holidays. However, the House did not take up the amended version of the bill prior to the adjournment of session. During the 2022 Legislative Session, SB 1500 was filed to formally designate May 20th as "Emancipation Day" to officially commemorate the freeing of enslaved African Americans in Florida. Unlike the previously filed legislation in 2021, SB 1500 did not propose the creation of a legal holiday but would have authorized the Governor to issue an annual proclamation to designate May 20th as "Emancipation Day" and encourage public officials, schools, private organizations, and all citizens to honor the historic significance of the day. SB 1500 was approved by one Senate committee; however, there was no companion legislation in the House. No similar bills were filed during the 2023 and 2024 Legislative Sessions. Staff will continue to monitor similar legislation and advocate for the establishment of Florida's Emancipation Day as a state holiday during the 2025 Legislative Session.

Action: Support legislation establishing May 20th, Florida's Emancipation Day, as a state holiday.

Medicaid Expansion

Issue: The Medicaid program was established in 1965 as a federal-state-local partnership to provide health insurance coverage to low-income children and their families, seniors, and people with disabilities. The federal government provides oversight and broad guidelines for Medicaid, such as minimum eligibility and benefit requirements, while states have flexibility within these guidelines in administering the program, often in partnership and with assistance from counties. This flexibility allows states to respond to unforeseen increases in health care needs and costs due to factors such as changing demographics, new medical technology and ways to deliver care as well as public health emergencies such as COVID-19.

The Affordable Care Act (ACA) granted states the ability to expand Medicaid eligibility to nearly all low-income adults, including those without children, earning up to 138% of the federal poverty level. In 2012, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that this expansion of the Medicaid program is optional for states (*National Federation of Independent Business v. Sebelius*). Florida is currently one of 10 states that have not opted to expand coverage to low-income adults without children

under the ACA. According to a 2019 report by the Florida Policy Institute, to qualify for Medicaid in Florida, a family of three with dependent children must not earn more than 32% of the federal poverty level, or \$6,825 per year (based upon the 2019 federal poverty threshold reflected in the report). To qualify for marketplace health insurance assistance, a family of three with dependent children must earn at least \$21,330 per year. Families earning between \$6,825 and \$21,330 in annual income are not eligible for any coverage, representing what is known as the “coverage gap.”

To offset the financial burden of covering additional individuals, the federal government covered 100% of the Medicaid costs for newly eligible enrollees in FY 2016, 94% of costs starting in FY 2018, and 90% in FY 2020 and thereafter. According to the Florida Policy Institute report referenced above, the State of Florida would realize millions in net savings by accessing these enhanced federal matching funds for income-based Medicaid beneficiaries under expansion. Additionally, in a paper published in 2020 in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, researchers from Harvard and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology concluded that Medicaid spending has been subsidized entirely by increased federal funding to states that have expanded access, with no significant changes in spending from state revenues associated with Medicaid expansion, and no evidence that Medicaid expansion forced states to cut back on spending on other priorities, such as education, transportation, or public assistance. The paper also found that the enhanced federal matching dollars from Medicaid in expansion states also offset costs incurred by public hospitals, mental health centers, and health care providers for people involved in the criminal justice system.

On September 29, 2020, the Board adopted a resolution of support for Medicaid expansion in Florida, which was requested and supported by the Medicaid Matters for Florida Coalition and the League of Women Voters. Accordingly, the County’s legislative team will continue its advocacy for Medicaid expansion during the upcoming session.

Action: Support the expansion of the Medicaid program in Florida to provide coverage eligibility for adults under the age of 65 with incomes up to 138% of the federal poverty level, as provided in the Affordable Care Act.

Amtrak Passenger Rail Restoration

Issue: In August 2005, Amtrak’s Sunset Limited passenger rail service for the Gulf Coast region, between New Orleans and Jacksonville through Leon County, was suspended due to the impacts of Hurricane Katrina. Shortly after, Leon County began to engage our local legislative delegation, CSX, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), and others to advocate for the restoration of passenger rail service along the Gulf Coast region.

Efforts are ongoing at this time to restore rail service, and in recent years, state and local governments in Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama have been successful in

securing federal funding to address key infrastructure needs, and to support operations of passenger rail service between New Orleans, Louisiana and Mobile, Alabama. In 1982, these three states formed an interstate rail compact now known as the Southern Rail Commission (SRC) for the purpose of supporting rail service. The SRC allows for membership by contiguous states; however, Florida has not elected to join the SRC or efforts to extend passenger rail service into the state. Given the increased federal investment in freight and passenger rail infrastructure (more detail provided in the federal priorities section), the State of Florida's participation can support efforts to secure federal funding for passenger rail restoration in the Gulf Coast region going forward. Most recently, at its September 17, 2024 meeting, the Board approved support for the following policy proposal to be considered during FAC's Innovation & Policy Conference:

“Support the State of Florida becoming a member of the Southern Rail Commission (SRC) and actively working to secure federal funding for the restoration of passenger rail throughout Florida.”

Final consideration of this proposal as a legislative policy for the upcoming session will take place during FAC's Legislative Conference scheduled for December 4 – 6, 2024. During the 2025 Session, staff will continue to advocate for the State of Florida to join the SRC and engage the state as well as other stakeholders in supporting the restoration of Amtrak passenger rail service.

Action: Support efforts to restore passenger rail service between New Orleans and Jacksonville through Leon County and urge the State of Florida to join the Southern Rail Commission.

Public Safety on College and University Campuses

Issue: Gun rights legislation has taken a prominent role during recent legislative sessions, with a broad variety of bills introduced each year addressing how and where firearms can be carried in Florida, including college and university campuses. In 2015, the Board unanimously approved a resolution supporting Florida State University, Florida A&M University, and Tallahassee State College in their unified opposition to allowing concealed weapons on university and college campuses. This has also been a top priority of the Board during previous legislative sessions.

During the 2023 Legislative Session, the Governor signed HB 543 into law which allows citizens to carry concealed weapons without a government-issued permit. Effective July 1, Florida officially became the 26th state to allow permit-less carry of concealed guns. In effect, HB 543 requires a person who is carrying a concealed weapon or firearm without a government-issued permit to carry identification to be displayed upon demand by law enforcement. The legislation, however, preserved an existing provision under section 790.06(12)(a), F.S., that prohibits concealed carry in certain locations which include college and university facilities.

Action: Oppose statutory changes to section 790.06, F.S., that would allow the concealed carrying of firearms into college or university facilities.

Public Records Exemption for Election Workers

Issue: During the September 14, 2021 meeting, Leon County Supervisor of Elections Mark Earley requested the County's support for legislation that would create new exemptions from Florida's public records laws for elections personnel. Supervisor Earley reported that the proposal originated from the Florida State Association of Supervisors of Elections and, in light of the increasing number of physical threats against Supervisors of Elections and their deputies around the country, has been one of the association's top legislative priorities. Specifically, the proposal seeks an amendment to section 119.071(4)(d)(2), F.S., to create a new subparagraph which reads:

"The home addresses, telephone numbers, and dates of birth of current and former county supervisors of elections, current and former employees of county supervisor of election offices, and current and former poll workers; the names, home addresses, telephone numbers, dates of birth, and places of employment of the spouses and children of such supervisors of elections and employees of county supervisor of election offices; and the names and locations of schools and day care facilities attended by the children of such supervisors of elections and employees of county supervisor of election offices are exempt from s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State Constitution."

The Board has supported this policy proposal during the past three Legislative Sessions and the Supervisor of Elections Office is requesting the Board's continued support for this issue in the 2025 session.

Action: Support a revision to section 119.071(4)(d)(2), F.S., to exempt personally identifying information of elections personnel from public records requests.

Statewide Database for Voting Rights Restoration

Issue: During the 2018 General Election, Florida voters approved Amendment 4 to restore the voting rights of Floridians with felony convictions after they complete all terms of their sentence including parole or probation, with the exception of murder or sexual offenses. Subsequently, during the 2019 Legislative Session, SB 7066 was approved and later signed into law by the Governor, to carry out the constitutional amendment which defined the terms of sentence a felon must complete before voting to include payment of legal financial obligations, such as fees, fines, and other court costs, associated with a felony conviction. While the State's interpretation of the terms of sentence to be completed faced court challenges, specifically the inclusion of payment of financial obligations, in 2020 the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals upheld the State's eligibility requirements for voter restoration.

Since that time, there has been confusion among felons trying to verify voting eligibility without clarity on how to determine outstanding fees and fines to be paid. The Florida Division of Elections is responsible for reviewing voter-registration applications to determine eligibility; however, the State has experienced a significant backlog in voter registration applications awaiting review in recent years. Furthermore, while County Supervisor of Election offices are responsible for removing ineligible voters from voter records, the State is required to notify local election offices of individuals who have been flagged as ineligible to vote, but such notification often is not provided by the State until years after an individual has been flagged and after the individual has registered to vote.

In 2022, the Florida Office of Election Crimes (FOEC) was created to investigate voter fraud. Since then, more than two-dozen individuals have been arrested throughout the state for voting illegally in prior elections, including an individual who was arrested in Leon County for voter fraud in September 2023 after being under investigation by the FOEC for over a year. In each of these arrests, the charged individuals indicated that they were issued voter registration cards by their local elections office, and therefore believed that they were eligible to vote. In light of these instances, during the 2024 Legislative Workshop, the Board adopted a legislative priority in support of legislation for the creation of a reliable statewide database where individuals and election officials can determine whether there are any outstanding legal financial obligations that would preclude an individual's eligibility to vote.

Most recently, in August 2024, the Florida Division of Elections released a proposed rule to establish a new process aimed at providing more clarity for people seeking to determine if they are eligible to vote. The proposed process includes a one-page form for felons requesting advisory opinions from state lawyers to clarify if they are eligible to vote. The proposal would provide the Florida Division of Elections two weeks to determine whether a form is complete or provide notification to the submitter of the specific deficiency or the need for any specific, additional information to complete the form. From there, the proposed rule would mandate the state to issue an advisory opinion within 90 days of receiving a request to provide one of the following three responses:

- (1) *"You are eligible to register and vote";*
- (2) *"You are ineligible to register or vote";*
- (3) *"The Division lacks credible and reliable information concerning your eligibility to register or to vote; therefore, based on your good faith belief that all terms of the sentence have been satisfied, the information available to the Division, and the Division's review of available information, nothing precludes you from registering and voting."*

While the proposed rule seeks to provide additional clarity, the proposed responses would not provide specific guidance to whether there are any outstanding legal financial obligations to be paid by an individual. Furthermore, recognizing the

current backlog of individuals who are uncertain about their voting statuses, as well as the months-long delays in responses to requests for advisory opinions experienced in recent years, it is unclear when the proposed process will be finalized and whether safeguards would be in place to ensure individuals receive timely resolution related to their eligibility. Given these considerations, it is recommended that the Board continue to support legislation for the creation of a reliable statewide database where individuals and election officials can determine whether there are any outstanding legal financial obligations that would preclude an individual's eligibility to vote.

Action: Support legislation for the creation of a reliable statewide database to determine voter eligibility.

Promoting Resident Ownership of Manufactured-Mobile Home Communities

Issue: Prior to the start of the 2023 State Legislative Session, the Board adopted a legislative priority to support legislation promoting resident ownership of manufactured-mobile home communities. In light of the increasing affordable housing demand nationwide, manufactured-mobile homes are becoming a popular housing alternative due to their affordability compared to other housing options. Manufactured-mobile homes are commonly located in land-lease communities (also known as and referred to in this item as “manufactured-mobile home parks”), in which a resident owns a manufactured-mobile home but leases the land upon which the home is located. In recent years there has been an increase in the purchase of manufactured-mobile home parks by private investors which, in many cases, has resulted in adverse impacts for the manufactured-mobile homeowners residing in them. Specially, when changes in ownership of manufactured-mobile home parks take place, residents in such communities may be vulnerable to potential closure of a community or rapid and unexpected increases in the amount of money owed under the land lease, which often drives low-income residents to sell or relocate their manufactured-mobile homes or abandon them altogether. As a result, various states have enacted laws to better support manufactured-mobile homeowners, especially low-income households, by promoting resident purchase opportunities.

Section 723.071, F.S., requires an owner of a manufactured-mobile home park who wishes to offer the park for public sale to provide the homeowners' association with notice and a right of first refusal. However, the required notice and first right of refusal is limited to formalized homeowners' associations (not individual homeowners) and only if the manufactured-mobile home park owner lists the park for sale. While homeowners' associations have the right to purchase the community provided that they meet the price and the terms and conditions of the sale in these instances, they must enter into a contract with the manufactured-mobile home park owner within 45 days of the mailing of the notice.

The first right of refusal is not applicable if and when a manufactured-mobile home park owner receives an unsolicited offer to buy the park without having listed it for

sale. Should the owner accept the unsolicited purchase offer, section 723.071, F.S., only requires the manufactured-mobile home park owner to provide notice of the sale to the homeowners' association and disclose the price and material terms and conditions upon which the owner would consider selling the park to the homeowners' association. However, there are no requirements for manufactured-mobile home park owners to provide the first right of refusal to individual homeowners. This proposed legislative priority seeks to build upon consumer protections already provided in Florida Statutes by enhancing notice requirements to put individual homeowners on equal footing with organized homeowners' associations. It would also extend the first right of refusal provisions currently required when manufactured-mobile home parks are listed for sale to include circumstances when unsolicited offers are received and considered by park owners.

Action: Support legislation to expand the notice and first right of refusal requirements for the sale of manufactured-mobile home parks to include unsolicited offers by a third party so that property owners have an opportunity to counter the purchase offer and remain in their homes.

Florida Association of Counties (FAC) Issues

Issue: FAC's mission is to help Florida's counties serve and represent Floridians by preserving county home rule through advocacy, education, and collaboration. Representing all 67 counties before the Florida Legislature, FAC addresses issues that have broad statewide appeal such as the opposition of unfunded mandates or cost shifts to counties, growth management, annexation, revenue-sharing, and water management issues.

Annually, FAC hosts the Innovation & Policy Conference and Legislative Conference to develop and finalize FAC's legislative policies for the upcoming legislative session. The statewide issues identified by the FAC membership will assist staff in identifying the most critical issues facing counties during the state legislative session. Generally, these are issues of broad statewide appeal, such as the opposition of unfunded mandates or cost shifts to counties, growth management, revenue-sharing, and water management issues. FAC will finalize its 2025 legislative program during the 2024 – 2025 Legislative Conference in Hillsborough County, which will take place December 4 – 6, 2024. Staff recommends the Board's support of the 2025 FAC legislative program unless specific issues conflict with Leon County's interests.

Action: Support the 2025 FAC legislative program unless specific issues conflict with Leon County's interests.

PROPOSED POLICY REQUESTS
119TH UNITED STATES CONGRESS, FIRST SESSION

Each year staff evaluates the trends and issues affecting all County programs and services to identify potential policy or substantive legislative issues at the federal level. Most substantive issues affecting the County at the federal level are coordinated through the County's National Association of Counties (NACo) representation. Squire Patton Boggs, the County's federal contract lobbying firm, works closely with staff on select federal policy issues that have been identified as Leon County priorities by the Board. Staff coordinates regularly with the County's federal lobbying team to strategize on key budget issues, and to identify federal grant opportunities that could potentially fund Leon County projects. In addition, Squire Patton Boggs assists staff in preparing periodic updates to the Board on federal legislative activities. Squire Patton Boggs Federal Legislative and Regulatory Action Report for Fall 2024 is provided as Attachment #3.

On November 5, 2024, Americans will head to the polls to vote for President, determine one-third of the U.S. Senate, and the entire House of Representatives. The 2024 election cycle takes place following two major hurricanes to impact the Southeast U.S. and escalating global conflicts. The candidates for the White House have presented their campaign platforms to the American public and, prior to taking office in 2025, all newly elected leaders will weigh in on federal spending and keeping the government open.

Last month, Congress averted a federal government shutdown by approving a continuing resolution (CR) before the start of the new federal fiscal year on October 1st. The CR extends federal fiscal year (FFY) 2024 funding for 12 additional weeks until December 20th so that negotiations may continue regarding federal spending levels for FFY 2025, which will be influenced by the outcome of the 2024 elections next month.

In anticipation of a new President and newly seated 119th Congress, Squire Patton Boggs will provide a post-election analysis detailing the Administration's priorities and anticipated level of support from Congress. The analysis will also present opportunities for the County to access new programs and secure federal funding. On March 1 – 4, 2025, the 2025 NACo Legislative Conference will be held in Washington, D.C., providing an opportunity to engage with new Administration officials and members of the Congressional Delegation to advance the County's federal priorities.

Following are the proposed Leon County 2025 federal legislative policy requests for the first session of the 119th Congress. Each request provides a brief overview of the issue and indicates the specific recommended legislative action.

Federal Funding for New Sewer Connections

Issue: For many years, Leon County has worked alongside the City of Tallahassee, the State of Florida, and other partners to expand sanitary sewer system infrastructure, and to convert properties from onsite septic treatment systems to centralized sewer service. Septic systems have been identified as a major source of nutrients (such as nitrogen and phosphorous) in groundwater, lakes, streams, and springs. When there are too many nutrients in surface water, they act as a fertilizer for fast-growing

bacteria and algae. This rapid growth can cause algal blooms that can reduce water quality, kill aquatic animals and plants, and form toxins in the water.

Leon County has employed a variety of strategies to reduce nutrients in local groundwater and surface water systems including conducting large scale septic-to-sewer conversion projects, septic system upgrades, community outreach and education efforts, and more. In recent years, approximately \$69 million has been committed (including \$36 million of local Leon County revenues) toward these efforts. At this time, more than 1,750 septic tank upgrades or replacements and sewer conversions in Leon County have either already been completed or are currently underway for completion in the near future. However, there are many more properties throughout Leon County which remain without central sewer service. For many of these properties, sewer service is available, but property owners have not elected to connect to the sewer system. In many cases, this is due in large part to the cost to the property owner; on average, sewer connection fees, abandoning the existing septic tank, and restoring the landscape on the property costs approximately \$10,000. As part of Leon County's current and recent septic-to-sewer projects, the County has paid the cost of new sewer connections on behalf of affected property owners. In February 2024, the County's legislative team met with representatives from the Federal Environmental Protection Agency to discuss program and funding opportunities to support sewer system connections.

Action: Support the allocation of federal funds to support a new grant program, authorized under Section 50209 of the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, that would help cover the costs of connecting low-income individuals to publicly owned wastewater treatment systems.

Amtrak Passenger Rail Restoration

Issue: Amtrak's Sunset Limited passenger rail service for the Gulf Coast Region, between New Orleans and Jacksonville through Leon County, was suspended following Hurricane Katrina in August 2005. Since that time, Leon County has engaged the local legislative delegation, FDOT, and federal and state partners to advocate for the resumption of passenger rail service along the Gulf Coast route. In July 2017, the Gulf Coast Rail Service Working Group, established by Congress to evaluate the restoration of the Gulf Coast rail service route, presented its final report identifying sustained financial support for capital improvement needs and projected operating losses as a key challenge to service restoration. The final report identified short-term and long-term phase projects and federal funding opportunities to support restoration efforts including the Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements (CRISI) Program, and the Restoration and Enhancement Grants (REG) Program. More recently, the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) included \$66 billion in funding for passenger and freight rail infrastructure, which is the largest investment in rail transit since the creation of Amtrak 50 years ago. Specifically, the IIJA dedicates new federal funding through the CRISI and REG programs to eliminate Amtrak's backlog of deferred rail maintenance, creates

new and renovates existing corridors nationwide, and increases funding for federal competitive grants that support intercity rail improvements.

In recent years, state and local governments in Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama have been successful in securing grants through CRISI and REG to address key infrastructure needs and to support operations of passenger rail service between New Orleans, Louisiana and Mobile, Alabama. In 1982, these three states formed an interstate rail compact now known as the Southern Rail Commission (SRC) for the purpose of supporting rail service. The SRC allows for membership by contiguous states; however, Florida has not elected to join. Working with local, state, and federal governments, the SRC has secured funds to resume twice-daily passenger rail service between New Orleans and Mobile. In early 2023, the SRC and Amtrak announced key project milestones for restoration of rail service within this segment along the Gulf Coast, which will be named the “Mardi Gras Service”. In September 2023, the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) announced the award of a \$178 million grant to complete the necessary train depot improvements in Mobile. The route is anticipated to open in February 2025. Once completed, the SRC plans for passenger rail service to resume with two trains daily between New Orleans and Mobile, with stops in Bay St. Louis, Gulfport, Biloxi, and Pascagoula, Mississippi. Staff will continue to keep the Board apprised of these efforts and will continue to advocate for the restoration of passenger rail service along the full Gulf Coast route.

Action: Support efforts to facilitate the restoration of passenger rail service in the Gulf Coast region.

Federal Cannabis Legislation

Issue: In recent years, several states have passed laws authorizing the use of cannabis for medical and/or recreational use. At this time, 38 states and the District of Columbia have approved measures to regulate cannabis for medical use, and 24 states approved measures to regulate personal recreational use of cannabis for adults. In Florida, a proposed constitutional amendment will be on the November 2024 General Election ballot for the legalization of recreational use of cannabis for adults. Regardless of state laws, Article VI of the United States Constitution provides that federal law preempts state law, even when those laws conflict. Accordingly, any possession or use of marijuana, even if legal under state law, remains illegal under federal law and is punishable under the Controlled Substance Act (CSA).

During the 2022 Legislative Priorities Workshop, the Board approved a policy priority supporting the Marijuana Opportunity Reinvestment and Expungement Act (the “MORE Act”) or similar legislation related to the decriminalization of marijuana at the federal level. On April 1, 2022, the U.S. House passed the MORE Act (H.R.3617). As proposed, the MORE Act would decriminalize marijuana at the federal level by removing it from the Controlled Substances Act (CSA). The CSA places all controlled substances regulated under federal law into one of five

“schedules” based upon the substance’s medical use, potential for abuse, and safety or dependence liability. Marijuana is currently classified as a Schedule I drug in the CSA, which includes substances that the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) have determined to have a high potential for abuse, no currently accepted medical use, and a lack of safety for use under medical supervision. The MORE Act would have de-scheduled marijuana under federal law, and effectively eliminate criminal penalties for the manufacturing, distribution, or possession of marijuana. The bill would have also decriminalized marijuana retroactively, and would establish a process to expunge prior convictions for marijuana-related offenses. The bill called for establishing a trust fund to support services for individuals most adversely affected by cannabis-related convictions, utilizing funds from a proposed excise tax on cannabis products. The MORE Act was ultimately not passed by the Senate in 2022. While the MORE Act was reintroduced in September 2023, it was ultimately not considered during the last session of Congress.

In January 2024, the FDA in coordination with the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) conducted a review of research which determined that marijuana has legitimate medical uses and was eligible for rescheduling under the CSA. Subsequently, in May 2024, the DEA announced its intent to ease federal restrictions on marijuana by downgrading the drug’s status in the CSA from Schedule I to Schedule III. At that time, the DEA opened a 60-day public comment period to gather and consider information and views submitted by the public, in order to make a determination on the appropriate schedule. The public comment period ended on July 22, 2024, with 43,000 comments submitted, nearly 93% of which were in favor of reclassifying marijuana under federal law. Among the comments in support of the rescheduling of marijuana, nearly 62% indicated that they prefer that cannabis be de-scheduled completely. Since that time, the DEA has scheduled a hearing on the proposed rule change to take place December 2, 2024, before a final decision on reclassifying marijuana is made which is anticipated early next year.

Action: Support federal legislation related to the decriminalization of marijuana at the federal level, including the de-scheduling of marijuana from the Controlled Substances Act.

Federal Lands for Affordable Housing and Public Services

Issue: The federal government owns 99 parcels within Leon County totaling nearly 106,000 acres of lands including a portion of the Apalachicola National Forest, post offices, federal agency offices, Federal Correctional Institution-Tallahassee, and a U.S. Navy Reserve Station. All properties located within the Urban Service Area, as designated in the Tallahassee Leon County Comprehensive Plan, are either improved or within the boundaries of the Apalachicola National Forest. Recognizing that the federal government owns a substantial amount of vacant land within the County, the Board recently adopted the following Strategic Initiative during its January 2024 Retreat:

Evaluate future opportunities to acquire eligible, non-conservation, federal lands for the provision of affordable housing and public services. (2024-84)

The process for disposal of real property by the federal government is provided by the Federal Management Regulation (Title 41, Section 102, Code of Federal Regulations, referred to as “FRM” under this section). The FMR prescribes policies concerning property management and related administrative activities of the General Services Administration (GSA). Section 102-75 of the FMR provides standards and guidelines for all executive branch agencies related to the disposal of excess property. Under the FMA, each agency must survey real property that it owns at least annually and identify any property that is not utilized, underutilized, or not being put to optimum use. Further, each agency must maintain its real property at the absolute minimum consistent with economical and efficient conduct of the affairs of the agency. Upon identifying property that an agency determines to be in excess of its needs, the agency must notify the GSA.

Once a federal agency determines a property is no longer needed to carry out its program responsibilities, the GSA first offers the property to other federal agencies that may have a program need for it. If there is no further federal need for the property, state and local governments are then notified that the surplus property is available as a “public benefit conveyance”. However, agencies that own reserved lands, such as those within a National Forest, must generally receive Congressional authorization prior to listing the property as surplus. Accordingly, this workshop item recommends the Board approve a federal policy priority for the County’s legislative team to coordinate and engage with the County’s federal delegation and lobbying team to identify and pursue opportunities to acquire eligible, non-conservation, federal lands for the provision of affordable housing and public services.

Action: Coordinate and engage with the County’s federal delegation and lobbying team in evaluating opportunities to acquire eligible, non-conservation, federal lands for the provision of affordable housing and public services.

Foreign Trade Zone Application

Issue: In 1934, the United States created the U.S. Foreign-Trade Zone (FTZ) Program to improve the competitiveness of U.S. companies versus foreign based companies. An FTZ is a designated area within a country where imported goods can be stored or processed without being subject to import duty which improves U.S. competitiveness by reducing operation costs. Specifically, FTZs encourage value-added activities at U.S. facilities in competition with foreign alternatives by allowing delayed or reduced duty payments on foreign merchandise, as well as other savings. The competitive advantages for businesses located in FTZs vary depending upon the type of operations involved and authority granted by the federal Foreign-Trade Zones Board and U.S. Customs and Border Protection Customs, but generally may include duty exemptions/deferrals, inverted tariffs, merchandise processing fee reductions, and others.

Across the country, there are 193 active FTZs, with 20 active FTZs located in Florida. Currently, the Tallahassee-Leon County area is not directly served by any of the existing FTZs in North Florida, which has resulted in a service area gap between Panama City and Jacksonville. In 2014, the Tallahassee City Commission authorized staff to pursue the creation of an FTZ at the Tallahassee International Airport, which would serve as a significant catalyst for international trade, and in turn local and regional economic growth and diversification for the local area. Since 2014, the City has been in continued coordination with U.S. Customs and Border Protection to complete prerequisite steps required to finalize and submit its application and receive formal authority to establish the FTZ. In November 2023, as directed by the Board, the County provided a letter in support of the City's application for a foreign trade zone designation at the Tallahassee Airport. The City's formal application was subsequently submitted to the Foreign-Trade Zone Board and is now pending approval. As part of this process, the City is also completing construction of an International Processing Facility at the airport, a key milestone in the FTZ process. The City anticipates its FTZ application will be approved concurrent with the completion of the International Processing Facility in 2025 – which is projected to generate over 1,660 jobs, and have an economic impact of \$304 million annually by 2034.

Action: Support the City of Tallahassee's application for a Foreign Trade Zone at the Tallahassee International Airport.

National Association of Counties (NACo) Issues

Issue: The National Association of Counties (NACo) advocates with a collective voice on behalf of America's 3,069 county governments. Its membership includes urban, suburban, and rural counties. NACo's advocacy efforts are guided by a policy platform and single-subject policy resolutions adopted at each annual conference by policy committees and the full membership. Each year, most of the County's substantive federal priorities align with NACo's policy platform. For the first session of the 119th Congress, NACo will be advocating for or against a variety of substantive federal issues on behalf of all counties across the nation including infrastructure funding, health care and mental health reform, economic and workforce development, development of broadband technology and infrastructure, disaster relief and resilience, and more. NACo's current federal policy priorities are included as Attachment #4 to this workshop item.

Action: Support NACo's federal legislative program unless specific issues conflict with Leon County's interests.

Comparative Analysis of State Lobbying Contracts and State Appropriations

On September 17, 2024, the Board requested an update on the County's state lobbying services including an analysis of state appropriations among like-sized counties and their use of contract lobbying services. At that time, the Board requested an option to issue an RFP for additional lobbying services specifically focused on securing appropriations during the upcoming state

legislative session. Accordingly, this section of the workshop provides a comparative analysis of like-sized counties to review contracted lobbying services and funding secured in the state budget and concludes with options should the Board wish to obtain additional contract lobbying services specific to appropriations. For the comparative analysis, staff reviewed the FY 2024 – 2025 line-item budget approved by the Legislature (HB 5001) and associated State budget documents (Attachment #5), the Governor’s FY 2025 veto list (Attachment #6), and surveyed like-sized counties to gather information on their state legislative lobbying contracts. The information evaluated for this analysis is summarized as follows:

Comparison of Contracted State and Federal Lobbying Services

As discussed throughout this item, Leon County utilizes contract lobbying services at the state and federal levels to further the County’s legislative goals and in pursuit of appropriations for key local projects. The County’s contract lobbying firms provide support by advocating for the County’s legislative priorities at the state and federal level. The practice of retaining contract lobbyists is common among local governments to advance legislative priorities and to mitigate or defeat harmful legislation.

As the County’s contract state lobbyist since 2008, Capitol Alliance Group has advocated for the County’s policy and appropriations requests in the Florida Legislature for over 15 years. Squire Patton Boggs has served as the County’s federal lobbyists since 2002. Each year, the Board is provided with weekly Capitol Updates throughout the State Legislative Session and a Final Legislative Report to keep the Board apprised of advocacy efforts related to the County’s projects and policy priorities. In past years, the Board has had the discretion to extend the County’s existing lobbying agreements upon expiration of contract terms, or to issue a request for proposals (RFP) to consider alternative firms for state and federal lobbying services. Most recently, at the June 8, 2021 meeting, the Board authorized the County Administrator to enter into a new five-year contracts with Capitol Alliance Group and Squire Patton Boggs. Both contracts provided for a base term of three years with two one-year extensions. At that time, the Board proposed and approved increasing the County’s contracted rate with Capitol Alliance Group from \$70,000 to \$85,000 for the purpose of increasing the MWBE subcontractor participation in the contract. The contract with Squire Patton Boggs is for \$100,000.

Table #2 provides an overview of the current annual expenditures of like-sized counties and the City of Tallahassee for contracted lobbying services at the state and federal level. Leon County is among the majority of counties which have separate contracts for state and federal lobbying services. Lake County and the City of Tallahassee combine their state and federal lobbying needs into one contract. Escambia County has separate contracts for state and federal lobbying services but utilizes one firm for both services.

Of the six jurisdictions in Table #2 that separate state and federal lobbying contracts, three counties allocate more funding for state lobbying services than Leon County. Expenditures for state lobbying services range from \$54,000 to \$125,550. Notably, as detailed later in this item, St. Johns County spends the least amount of money on state lobbying services but secured the most state funding for local project requests in the State FY 2025 budget. Comparatively, St. Lucie County reflects the highest expenditures for contracted state lobbying services and did not successfully secure funding for local project requests in the State FY 2025 budget.

Among like-sized counties and the City of Tallahassee, the total annual expenditures for contracted state and federal lobbying services range from \$60,000 to \$204,000, with an average expenditure of \$156,000. Leon County has the third highest expenditures for combined state and federal lobbying services at \$185,000. Lake County and the City of Tallahassee currently have combined contracts for state and federal lobbying services, with total contract expenditures totaling \$60,000 and \$120,000, respectively.

The inclusion of County projects in the adopted State budget is determined by more than just the contracted lobbying firm. Funding can be affected by many factors such as the project prioritization process within State agencies, the political influence of legislative leadership, appropriations committees and members Chairing those important committees, legislative delegation members, and the priorities determined by the Governor when considering line-item

vetoed of the budget approved by the Legislature. The next section provides the comparative analysis of local funding secured in the state budget among like-sized counties.

State Agency Appropriations and Grants

In the process of developing the State's annual budget, the Legislature provides funding to counties to be administered through state agency appropriations as part of program grants or work programs. As noted previously, the County leverages the most state funding for County projects through agency appropriations. In some cases, the awarded projects are specifically included in the state budget. Examples of such appropriations include projects funded through the Florida Department of Transportation's Work Program and cultural and historic preservation program grants administered by the Department of State. In other cases, only the program funding is provided in the budget for a state agency to administer a competitive grant program and award the funds during the fiscal year. Examples include the Florida Department of Environmental Protection Water Quality Improvement Grant Program and the Springs Protection Grant Program which the County has successfully leveraged for septic-to-sewer projects. The County aggressively seeks these funding opportunities to support County projects and has been successful in recent years securing funding through many of these programs, particularly for major infrastructure projects.

Attachment #7 provides a broader view of the total appropriations awarded within each county in the final FY 2025 budget beyond just the line-item local project requests. It is based on the data included in the County-by-County allocations report (Attachment #5) which includes projects carried out by state agencies, local governments, non-profit organizations, or private entities. For comparative analysis, the funding for each county is categorized as follows: Higher Education; Transportation; Water & Environment; Early Learning & Workforce Development; Culture, Community, & Nonprofit; Technology, Public Safety & Other Capital Improvements. As reflected in Attachment #7, funding for higher education is disproportionately higher in Leon, Alachua, and Escambia Counties due to the presence of large state colleges and universities. Funding for transportation projects represents the largest share of State investment among the remaining four like-sized counties. Further analysis on transportation funding is provided in the next section of this analysis. Though funding for technology, public safety and other capital improvements makes up a small portion of the State's investments in each county, it is disproportionately higher in Leon County given the maintenance and improvement costs associated with the Capitol Complex and State agency properties.

Additional Analysis on State Transportation Funding

This section provides additional analysis on state transportation funding through FDOT's Annual Work Program. As noted previously, in addition to line-item appropriations, the state budget also provides funding to be administered through state agencies for projects within specific counties such as transportation projects funded through the FDOT's Work Program. Most recently, the total funding allocated for transportation projects in Leon County in FY 2025 was \$79.8 million, reflecting a 55% increase from FY 2024. Notably, the appropriations for transportation projects in the County-by-County allocations report (Attachment #5) only reflect projects that are \$1 million or greater in the FDOT Tentative Work Program for FY 2024 – 2025. Unlike local project requests which are submitted by Legislators and listed in the appropriations bill as line-items,

transportation projects included in FDOT’s Annual Work Program are identified and prioritized at the local and regional level through metropolitan planning organizations (MPO) in coordination with the respective regional FDOT offices. For example, in Leon County, the transportation funding included in the budget reflect those identified and prioritized by the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) which were submitted to FDOT for inclusion in its Annual Work Program. These projects are captured within various funding categories under the FDOT’s Annual Work Program such as Arterial Highway Construction, Interstate Highway Construction, and Right-of-Way Land Acquisition. Table #3 provides a comparison of the FDOT’s transportation funding allocations in Leon County from the past three state budget cycles with examples of some of the major funding categories to demonstrate how funding levels can vary from year to year based on project needs, phases, and prioritization.

As reflected in Table #3, FDOT’s transportation allocations can vary in any given budget year and across funding categories depending on the projects and project phases prioritized under FDOT’s Annual Work Program. For example, the majority of the transportation funding allocated in Leon County for FY 2025 is for resurfacing projects which will support the completion of over 20 resurfacing projects throughout the County including multiple project sites along Crawfordville Road, Thomasville Road, and Woodville Highway. In FY 2023, the bulk of the transportation funding allocated in Leon County was for Arterial Highway Construction which provided a State Infrastructure Bank Loan for the Blueprint IA Northeast Gateway Project. Subsequently, in FY 2024, the Blueprint IA Northeast Gateway Project received \$2.5 million in Transportation Planning Grant funding administered through the CRTPA.

Full project funding for major roadway projects may also be realized over many years. The widening of Capital Circle Southwest from Orange Avenue to Crawfordville Road is currently under construction by FDOT. The planning study for widening Capital Circle Southwest began in 2006 and construction funds for these project segments were provided in FDOT’s FY 2022 Annual Work Program (for Orange Avenue to Springhill Road), with additional funds tentatively programmed in FY 2026 (for Springhill Road to Crawfordville Road). Another example is the

widening of Crawfordville Road in Leon County. This project is currently being designed by FDOT and funding for right-of-way acquisition is tentatively programmed in FY 2026 and FY 2027. As the project phases continue to advance, construction funding is anticipated following the right-of-way acquisition process.

Table #4 provides a comparison of transportation funding allocated among like-sized counties in the FY 2025 State budget. While the like-sized counties have traditionally been used to compare Leon County Government expenditures and organizational size to counties of similar demographics or overall budget, there are other factors to consider in the evaluation of state transportation funding. For example, the total land area, state road miles, vehicular traffic, and rapid population growth will impact the FDOT budget for resurfacing, maintenance, and construction needs. Among the like-sized counties, Leon County is most comparable to Alachua County as inland communities of similar size and population with one major interstate highway. Much like how FDOT funding will vary year-to-year in a given county based on project phasing and prioritization, there is also variation in the total transportation allocations among like-sized counties based on the local MPO’s prioritization and FDOT’s project needs.

Table #4 provides data on the specific transportation funding categories to distinguish how the funding is allocated in each county. As reflected in Table #4, Leon County received the least amount of transportation funding in FY 2025 among the like-sized counties. As noted previously, the majority of the transportation funding allocated in Leon County is for resurfacing projects which will support the completion of over 20 resurfacing projects throughout the County. Funding for right-of-way acquisition and new construction, however, is planned in FDOT's Work Plan to be budgeted in the future years. Several of the counties have major Interstate Highway and Arterial Highway Construction projects ready to commence. FDOT is also in the right-of-way acquisition process for various stages of the turnpike widening project in Lake County. As noted previously, St. Johns County is an outlier among the like-sized counties. The majority of funding allocated in St. Johns County (over \$771 million) was allocated for interstate construction funding which will support reconstruction improvements along Interstate 95 and State Road 16.

Funding is not intended to be equitably distributed among the transportation funding categories as there are different needs, priorities, and geographic distinctions in each county. For example, in FY 2025, bridge construction funding was awarded to St. Lucie and Escambia Counties, which are both coastal communities. While funding has been allocated for bridge construction in Leon County in prior years (most recently \$1.75 million in FY 2024), recognizing that Leon County is an inland community, funding is not expected to be prioritized for bridge construction funding in Leon County as frequently as other communities, which can cause variation in total funding allocated throughout the like-sized counties. In addition, other counties' transportation funding includes allocations for transportation categories that are not applicable to Leon County such as seaport project grants. St. Johns County is an outlier with nearly all of its transportation funding provided for major interstate highway construction projects which have been planned, designed, and fostered over many years. Notably, St. Johns County had a small but politically influential legislative delegation during the 2024 State Legislative Session. The three legislators were each aligned with the majority party including the Speaker of the House, a member serving on the Appropriations Committee, and the Fiscal Policy Chair in the Senate. Interstate improvements may be needed greatly in St. Johns County due to rapid population growth in recent years, and the timing of this project culminated in the final year of one its delegation members serving as Speaker of the House.

Additional Analysis on Grant Funding for Water Projects

In recent years, the Legislature has reduced funding for local projects, instead promoting the availability of existing grant programs through the executive branch. Recognizing these grant programs are funded on a statewide basis, organizations such as the Florida Association of Counties are instrumental in lobbying in support of program funding being fully funded in the state budget on an annual basis.

Most recently, the Governor vetoed over \$205 million in stormwater, wastewater, and sewer projects totaling \$410.4 million in water project appropriations proposed in the Legislature's FY 2024 – 2025 budget. The Governor's advocated for these projects to compete for grant funding administered through the FDEP. The County has been successful in recent years securing millions of dollars in grant funds through FDEP. Notably, the Leon County Water Quality and Springs Protection Infrastructure Improvement Plan, which is a first-of-its-kind agreement between the State and a county, was established in coordination with FDEP to commit nearly \$70 million in

state and local funds (including over \$30 million through FDEP) for septic system improvement projects in Leon County including the Woodville Sewer Project, Woodside Heights, Northeast Lake Munson, and Belair/Annawood septic-to-sewer projects, as well as the Advanced Septic Systems Pilot Project.

These funding commitments are not reflected year-to-year in the state budget as line items, but rather the total allocations to be administered through a specific grant program in that given year. For example, for FY 2025, a total of \$110 million was committed to FDEP's Water Quality Improvement Grant Program for water quality improvement projects. The County, as authorized by the Board on July 9, 2024, submitted a Water Quality Improvement Grant application requesting \$10 million for Phase 2 of the Woodville Sewer System Project. In addition, the FDEP works in partnership with water management districts to provide funding assistance for water resource projects that protect and restore springs, and other projects that improve water quality or quantity. For FY 2025, the County submitted two applications through the Northwest Florida Water Management District for FDEP Springs Restoration Grant funds for the Woodville Sewer System Project and the Munson Slough Embankment Repair Project. Grant awards for each of these applications are anticipated later this year.

Funding Secured for State Line-Item Local Projects

In the process of developing the State's annual budget, the Legislature may approve line-item appropriations in the budget for "local projects" – i.e., projects carried out by a local government, non-profit organization, or private entity which are sponsored by legislative members. The state line-item appropriations process is highly competitive and Legislators receive and consider many local funding requests from their legislative districts which may include several counties, cities, or communities. To best position the County to secure competitive state line-item funding, many of the local project requests include a one-to-one local match and are "shovel-ready," meaning that design and permitting for projects (if applicable) have already been completed. It should be noted, however, line-item state funding and inclusion of County projects in the adopted state budget can also be affected by many factors such as the project prioritization process within state agencies, the political influence of legislative leadership, appropriations committees and members chairing those important committees, legislative delegation members, and the priorities determined by the Governor when considering line-item vetoes of the budget approved by the Legislature.

Attachment #8 provides an overview of the state line-item local project requests submitted by Leon County over the past five years, including the total number and cost of projects submitted, whether the projects were included in the Legislature's budget or vetoed by the Governor, and the final outcome for projects included in the approved state budget. Most recently, while the final FY 2025 state budget allocated a total of \$114.4 million for line-item local project requests submitted by local universities, nonprofits, and other organizations within Leon County, each of the line-item local project funding requests submitted by Leon County were ultimately vetoed.

For comparison, Table #5 provides a breakdown of the line-item local project requests submitted during the 2024 State Legislative Session by county including the total number and cost of projects submitted, whether the projects were included in the Legislature's budget or vetoed by the Governor, and the final outcome for projects included in the approved State FY 2025 budget. In addition, the full list of County-by-County allocations, a report produced annually by the Florida

Legislature, and the Governor’s veto list which informed this analysis are provided as Attachment #5 and Attachment #6.

**In recent years, the Board has directed the County’s legislative team to support the following two appropriations requests submitted by community partners: the Florida African American Heritage Preservation Network (FAAHPN) to provide supplemental funding through direct grants to FAAHPN museums statewide; and the Florida Civil Rights Museum, Inc.’s (FCRM) funding request to sustain and expand its organization on a statewide basis. While funding was ultimately approved for both entities, (\$375,000 for the FAAHPN and \$250,000 for the FCRM), these funding awards are not captured in this analysis as both of these requests were to support respective efforts at the statewide level, rather than specific services to be provided in Leon County.*

As noted previously, following the Governor’s vetoes, no funding was ultimately approved for the line-item local project requests submitted by Leon County in 2024 through its Legislative Delegation members. Further, the City’s four line-item local project requests were not included in the Legislature’s FY 2025 budget. Similarly, St. Lucie County had only one local project request but it was not included in the Legislature’s budget. While several of the like-sized counties also had vetoed projects, the majority received at least one funded line-item local project request in the final approved budget, with total funding awards ranging from \$125,000 to \$2 million. Similar to the transportation appropriations as detailed above, St. Johns County was an outlier as it received \$20 million for four line-item local project funding requests. Based on the information provided in Table #5, there does not appear to be a correlation between the amount of funding awarded and the expenditure on lobbying services as St. Johns County spent the least on state lobbyists among the like-sized counties. The full list of projects that were requested and vetoed or awarded for each County is provided as Attachment #9.

Options to Supplement and/or Resolicit Contract Lobbying Services

As noted previously, the County's current contract with Capitol Alliance Group for state lobbying services began on October 1, 2021, with a base term of three years and two one-year extensions. As outlined in the County's contract for services (Attachment #1), the one-year extensions are automatic unless the County provides written notice of non-renewal at least thirty (30) days prior to the expiration of the then current term. As of October 1, 2024, the County is in its first of two one-year extensions which is in effect through September 30, 2025. Should the Board wish to revise or terminate its agreement with Capitol Alliance Group prior to the final one-year extension, written notice of non-renewal would be required by August 31, 2025. The following outlines options to supplement and/or resolicit the County's lobbying services contracts for the Board's consideration.

- Issue an RFP for Additional State Lobbying Services: As discussed at the September 17, 2024 meeting, the Board may choose to issue an RFP for additional state lobbying services, specifically for the purpose of securing state funds during the upcoming 2025 State Legislative Session. The selected firm would be contracted to perform such work in addition to the County's existing contract for state lobbying services. Should the Board wish to pursue this option, an RFP would be issued for a 30-day period following the ratification of this workshop item at the next Board meeting on November 19th. An agenda item would be brought back to the Board with recommendations based on the evaluation committee's review and ranking of the respondents at the first available meeting (likely January 28th or February 11th, 2025).

This option allows for the additional contract lobbying firm to be under contract approximately one month prior to the start of the 2025 State Legislative Session in March 2025. Under this option, funding (in an amount to be determined by the Board) for the additional state lobbying services would come from the General Fund contingency account and a Budget Amendment would be included in the workshop ratification item on November 19th prior to the issuance of the RFP as this option is an unbudgeted mid-year expenditure. Should the Board wish to allocate additional funds for state lobbying services, the County's state lobbying contract expenditures would be among the highest compared to like-sized counties. As previously mentioned, the County's current contract is \$85,000 per year which is in the mid-range of what comparable counties budget for these services. The most budgeted for state contract lobbying services among like-sized counties is \$125,550.

- Provide Additional Funding to Existing State Lobbyist to Expand Services: Should the Board wish to provide additional funding for state lobbying services focused on appropriations, the Board also has the discretion to modify its existing contract with Capitol Alliance Group to expand the scope of its lobbying services. Under this option, the County would provide additional funding to Capitol Alliance Group to subcontract additional lobbying services for the upcoming State Legislative Session to specifically advocate for the County's local project requests. This option would not require the County to issue an RFP. Accordingly, this would allow the Capitol Alliance Group to hire additional lobbying support prior to the start of the Legislature's Interim Committee weeks which begin in December 2024. Under this option, additional funding (as an amount to be determined by

the Board) to the Capitol Alliance Group would come from the General Fund contingency account and a Budget Amendment would be included in the workshop ratification item on November 19th, as well as an option to authorize the County Administrator to amend the County's existing contract with Capitol Alliance Group. Similar to the previous option, this would be an unbudgeted mid-year expenditure.

- Issue an RFP for State and Federal Lobbying Services for FY 2026: Another option the Board may wish to consider would be the planned consolidation of the County's state and federal lobbyist contracts. In June 2021, the County entered a new five-year contract with Squire Patton Boggs for federal lobbying services (Attachment #2) which provides for a base term of three years with two one-year extensions. Accordingly, the first of two one-year extensions is set to begin on January 1, 2025. Similar to the County's contract for state lobbying services, the one-year extensions are automatic unless the County provides written notice of non-renewal at least thirty (30) days prior to the expiration of the then current term. The County's current federal lobbying contract with Squire Patton Boggs is for \$100,000 annually.

In past years, there have been policy issues which are captured under both the County's state and federal legislative priorities. A recent example would be the County's support of Amtrak Passenger Rail Restoration along the Gulf Coast route, including support of the State of Florida joining the Southern Rail Commission. At times, there can be overlap in the County's efforts to secure state and federal funding for specific county projects, through both state and federal grant programs and line-item budget appropriations. With this in mind, the Board may (or may not) wish to explore the value in having one lobbying firm contracted to represent the County's interests at both the state and federal levels, specifically to align advocacy efforts of the County's legislative priorities and coordination of funding opportunities for County projects across both levels of government.

Furthermore, maintaining the County's current budgeted amount of \$185,000 (\$85,000 for state and \$100,000 for federal which is at the high end of the total funding budgeted for state and federal lobbying services among comparable counties) could allow for the County's state and federal interests to be represented more efficiently and cost-effectively. As noted previously in this item, there are other local governments, including the City of Tallahassee and Lake County, that have combined state and federal lobbying services into one contract. Should the Board wish to align the County's state and federal lobbyist contracts, staff would recommend issuing an RFP following the conclusion of the 2025 State Legislative Session for the Board's consideration and selection of a lobbying firm by this summer. At that time, the County will have the ability to evaluate the federal political landscape following the 2024 Presidential election and new Congress. In addition, this schedule would align with the FY 2026 budget process, would not require the use of contingency funds, and it would facilitate the necessary time to provide notice of non-contract renewal with the two incumbent lobbying firms as required under the County's existing contracts. Furthermore, this process would allow the Board to compare the performance of the County's two incumbent lobbying firms with respondents proposals received through the County's RFP process.

All of these options are provided for Board consideration only and are not exhaustive. The Board may wish to exercise any or none of the options provided as the selection or retention of state and federal lobbyists is at the sole discretion of the Board, consistent with notice provisions in the existing contracts.

Conclusion:

The Board's annual legislative priorities workshop enables the County's legislative team to receive important policy guidance from the Board regarding priority legislative issues, and directs the County's lobbying efforts for the upcoming year at both the state and federal level. As such, this workshop item recommends and seeks direction from the Board regarding several policy and appropriations priorities for the 2025 state and federal legislative sessions. As always, the Board may wish to add, remove, and/or amend legislative priorities as deemed appropriate.

Following this workshop, staff and the County's contract lobbying teams will pursue all of the priority issues approved by the Board. Throughout the 2025 legislative session, staff will keep the Board apprised of the status and progress of these priority issues, as well as other significant legislation affecting county governments through agenda items and weekly *Capitol Update* newsletters. A final report summarizing the 2025 Florida Legislative Session and any significant legislation enacted by Congress in the coming months will be presented to the Board in the summer of 2025.

Options:

1. Approve the 2025 State and Federal Legislative Priorities.
2. Provide any additional Board direction on the 2025 State and Federal Legislative Priorities or the state and federal contract lobbyists.
3. Direct the County Administrator to modify the contract with Capitol Alliance Group to subcontract with an additional lobbying firm, for an amount to be determined by the Board, to secure State appropriations for Leon County.
4. Authorize the issuance of a Request for Proposals for additional state lobbying services, for an amount to be determined by the Board, for the 2025 State Legislative Session.
5. Authorize the issuance of a Request for Proposals for FY 2026 state and federal lobbying services following the conclusion of the 2025 State Legislative Session.
6. Do not approve the 2025 State and Federal Legislative Priorities.
7. Board direction.

THIS LOBBYING SERVICES AGREEMENT dated this ____ day of September, 2021, is by and between Leon County, Florida, a political subdivision of the State of Florida (hereinafter referred to as the "County") and Capitol Alliance Group, Inc. (hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor"), collectively, the "Parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the County is in need of professional lobbying services; and

WHEREAS, the County has determined that it would be better to contract for these services than to hire the necessary personnel to satisfy the needs of the County; and

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the foregoing recitals, the sum of ten dollars (\$10.00) each to the other paid, the mutual covenants and promises contained herein and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which being acknowledged, the Parties do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

1. EFFECTIVE DATE; TERM; RENEWAL

- a. This Agreement shall be effective commencing October 1, 2021 and shall continue until September 30, 2024 (hereinafter "Initial Term").
- b. After the Initial Term, this Agreement may be extended for two (2) additional one (1) year Term(s) upon the same terms and conditions as set forth herein, at the sole option of the County. Such one (1) year extensions will be automatic unless the County provides written notice of non-renewal to the Contractor no less than thirty (30) days prior to the expiration date of the then current term.

2. SCOPE OF SERVICES

The Contractor hereby agrees to assist the County in enhancing the County's state legislative program year-round as approved by the Board of County Commissioners each year and as outlined in Attachment #1, attached hereto and incorporated herein.

3. WORK

Any work to be performed under this Agreement shall be upon the request of the County Administrator or designee, which request shall set forth the commencement date of such work and the time within which such work shall be completed. The Contractor shall perform lobbying services to the best of its ability, dealing honestly and fairly, accounting for all funds, and using necessary skill, care, and diligence in any transaction related thereto. No amount of work is provided for or guaranteed to the Contractor under this Agreement.

4. CONTRACT SUM

The Contractor agrees that for the performance of the services as outlined in Attachment #1, it shall be remunerated by the County in twelve (12) monthly installment payments of \$7,083.33, in a total sum not to exceed \$85,000.00 annually, and subject to the provisions in Section 12

herein.

5. PAYMENTS AND PAYMENT DISPUTE RESOLUTION

Payments shall be made and payment disputes resolved in accordance with Section 14 of Leon County Policy No. 96-1. The performance of the County of any of its obligations under this Agreement shall be subject to and contingent upon the availability of funds lawfully expendable for the purposes of this Agreement for the Initial Term and any renewal term(s).

Proper form for an invoice is a numbered document with date of invoice; reference to the County contract number and purchase order number; Contractor's name, address, billing contact person information, and Federal tax identification number. In addition, Contractor shall provide a monthly report of the Services performed by its MWSBE subcontractor and payments made thereto, as provided in Section 12 of this Agreement. The invoice must be properly addressed and delivered as provided in Section 9 herein. Delivery to another County address will void the invoice, and it shall be of no force and effect.

6. TERMINATION

The County may terminate this Agreement without cause by giving the Contractor not less than thirty (30) days prior written notice of intent to terminate. Either Party may terminate this Agreement for cause by giving the other Party hereto not less than thirty (30) days prior written notice of its intent to terminate. The County shall not be required to give Contractor such thirty (30) days written notice if, in the opinion of the County, the Contractor is unable to perform its obligations hereunder or if in the opinion of the County, the services being provided are not satisfactory. In such case, the County may immediately terminate this Agreement by providing a notice of termination to the Contractor.

Termination of this Agreement for any reason under this Section will not affect (i) any liabilities or obligations of either Party arising before such termination or as a result of the event(s) causing such termination or (ii) any damages or other remedies, at law or in equity, arising out of a breach of this Agreement that one of the Parties may be entitled to under this Agreement.

7. INDEMNIFICATION

The Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the County, including its officials, officers, employees and agents, from and against any and all claims, damages, liabilities, losses, costs, or suits of any nature whatsoever arising out of, because of, or due to any acts or omissions of the Contractor, its delegates, employees and agents, arising out of or under this Agreement, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs. The County may, at its sole option, defend itself or require the Contractor to provide the defense. The Contractor acknowledges that ten dollars (\$10.00) of the amount paid to the Contractor is sufficient consideration for the Contractor's indemnification of the County.

8. AUDITS, RECORDS, AND RECORDS RETENTION

The Contractor agrees:

- a. To establish and maintain books, records, and documents (including electronic storage media) in accordance with generally accepted accounting procedures and practices which sufficiently and properly reflect all revenues and expenditures of funds paid herein.
- b. To retain all client records, financial records, supporting documents, statistical records, and any other documents (including electronic storage media) pertinent to this Agreement for a period of five (5) years after termination of the Agreement or, if an audit has been initiated and audit findings have not been resolved at the end of five (5) years, the records shall be retained until resolution of the audit findings or any litigation which may be based on the terms of this Agreement.
- c. Upon completion or termination of the Agreement and at the request of the County, the Contractor will cooperate with the County to facilitate the duplication and transfer of any said records or documents during the required retention period as specified in paragraph b above. The County may reproduce any written materials generated as a result of the Contractor's work.
- d. To assure that all records required to be maintained by the Contractor hereby shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, review, or audit by County, Federal, state, or other personnel duly authorized by the County.
- e. To permit persons duly authorized by the County to have full access to and the right to examine any of the Contractor's records and documents related to this Agreement, regardless of the form in which the records are kept, at all reasonable times for as long as those records are retained.
- f. To include these aforementioned audit and recordkeeping requirements in all approved subcontracts and assignments.
- g. To ensure that any subcontractor providing Services under this Agreement complies with provisions in this Section.
- h. Comply with public records access requirements set forth in section 119.0701(2), Florida Statutes, including the obligation to:
 1. Keep and maintain public records required by the County to perform the Services required under this Agreement.
 2. Upon request from the County's custodian of public records, provide the County with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, or as otherwise provided by law.
 3. Ensure that public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of this Agreement and following termination of the Agreement if the Contractor does not transfer the records to the County.

4. Upon termination of the Agreement, transfer, at no cost, to the County all public records in possession of the Contractor or keep and maintain public records required by the County to perform the Services required hereunder. If the Contractor transfers all public records to the County upon termination of this Agreement, the Contractor shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements. If the Contractor keeps and maintains public records upon termination of this Agreement, the Contractor shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records. All records stored electronically must be provided to the County, upon request from the County's custodian of public records, in a format that is compatible with the information technology systems of the County.
- 5. 9. NOTICE

Upon execution of this Agreement, the Contractor shall provide, in writing, the name of the Contractor's staff member who will be responsible for the submission of all Contractor's records, reports, invoices, and documents to the County necessary for the administration of this Agreement.

The Contractor shall be responsible for demonstrating MWSBE subcontractor participation and submitting copies of such documentation in conjunction with the monthly invoice. The reports shall detail each invoice submitted to the County and a breakdown of payments to all subcontractors therein by MWSBE classification.

13. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

a. Status

The Contractor at all times relevant to this Agreement shall be an independent contractor, and in no event shall the Contractor or any employees, agents, or subcontractors under it be considered to be employees of the County.

b. Conflicting Employment

For the duration of this Agreement, the Contractor shall not enter into any other agreements that would ethically conflict with its obligations under this Agreement. The Contractor shall ensure that any subcontractor providing Services under this Agreement complies with this Section.

c. Registration

The Contractor shall be registered to conduct business with the Florida Department of State prior to execution of this Agreement unless Contractor provides written verification of its exempt status (See applicable sections of Title XXXVI, Chapters 605 through 623, Florida Statutes). During the term of this Agreement, the Contractor shall maintain its registration. Should the Contractor, by reason of revocation, failure to renew, or any other reason, fail to maintain its registration to conduct business, the Contractor shall be in default of this Agreement as of the date such registration expires. The Contractor shall ensure that any subcontractor that performs Services under this Agreement complies with this Section.

d. Assignments

This Agreement shall not be assigned as a whole or in part without the prior written consent of the County, nor shall the Contractor assign any monies due or to become due to it hereunder without the prior written consent of the County.

e. Monitoring

The Contractor shall permit persons duly authorized by the County to inspect any records, papers, documents, facilities, goods, and services of the Contractor which are relevant to this Agreement, and interview any clients and employees of the Contractor to assure the County of the Contractor's satisfactory performance of the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

f. Public Entity Crimes Statement

In accordance with section 287.133, Florida Statutes, Contractor hereby certifies that to the best of its knowledge and belief neither Contractor nor any affiliate has been convicted of a public entity crime. Contractor and its affiliates shall provide the County

with a completed public entity crime statement form no later than January 15 of each year this Agreement is in effect. Violation of this section by the Contractor shall be cause for termination of this Agreement by the County.

g. Unauthorized Alien(s) And E-Verify

The Contractor agrees that unauthorized aliens shall not be employed or utilized in the performance of Services under this Agreement. The County shall consider the employment or utilization of unauthorized aliens a violation of Section 274A(e) of the Immigration and Naturalization Act (8 U.S.C. 1324a). Such violation shall be cause for termination of this Agreement by the County.

1. Contractor agrees that it will enroll and participate in the federal E-Verify Program for Employment Verification. Contractor further agrees to provide to the County, within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this Agreement, documentation of such enrollment in the form of a copy of the E-Verify "'Edit Company Profile' screen", which contains proof of enrollment in the E-Verify Program (this page can be accessed from the "Edit Company Profile" link on the left navigation menu of the E-Verify employer's homepage).
2. Contractor further agrees that it will require each subcontractor that performs Services under this Agreement to enroll and participate in the E-Verify Program within sixty (60) days of the effective date of this Agreement or within sixty (60) days of the effective date of the contract between the Contractor and the subcontractor, whichever is later. The Contractor shall obtain from the subcontractor a copy' of the "Edit Company Profile" screen indicating enrollment in the E-Verify Program and make such record available to the County upon request.
3. Contractor will utilize the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system to verify the employment eligibility of: (i) all persons employed during the term of this Agreement by Contractor to perform employment duties within Florida; and (ii) all persons (including subcontractors) assigned by Contractor to perform Services pursuant to this Agreement.
 - (a) Contractor must use E-Verify to initiate verification of employment eligibility for all persons employed during the term of this Agreement by Contractor to perform employment duties within Florida within three (3) business days after the date of hire.
 - (b) Contractor must initiate verification of each person (including subcontractors) assigned by Contractor to perform Services pursuant to this Agreement within sixty (60) calendar days after the date of execution of this Agreement or within thirty (30) days after assignment to perform Services pursuant to this Agreement, whichever is later.
4. Contractor further agrees to maintain records of its participation and compliance with the provisions of the E-Verify program, including participation by its subcontractors as provided above, and to make such records available to the County or any authorized state entity consistent herewith.

5. Compliance with the terms of this Employment Eligibility Verification provision is made an express condition of this Agreement, and the County may treat a failure of the Contractor to comply as a material breach of this Agreement.

h. Non-Waiver

Failure by the County to enforce or insist upon compliance with any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement or failure to give notice or declare this Agreement terminated shall not constitute a general waiver or relinquishment of the same, or of any other terms, conditions, or acts but the same shall be and remain at all times in full force and effect.

i. Modifications

This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding of the Parties. Any modifications to this Agreement must be in writing and signed by both Parties.

j. Law, Jurisdiction, Venue, Waiver of Jury Trial

This Agreement shall be interpreted and construed in accordance with and governed by the laws of the State of Florida. Venue for all actions arising from, related to, or in connection with this Agreement shall be in the state courts of the Second Judicial Circuit in and for Leon County, Florida. If any claim arising from, related to, or in connection with this Agreement must be litigated in Federal court, the exclusive venue for any such lawsuit shall be in the United States District Court or United States Bankruptcy Court for the Northern District of Florida. By entering into this Agreement, the County and the Contractor hereby expressly waive any rights either of the Parties may have to a trial by jury of any civil litigation matter related to this Agreement.

k. Construction

The validity, construction, and effect of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida.

l. Compliance with Anti-Discrimination Legislation

In providing, or contracting to provide, Services and otherwise performing obligations under this Agreement, the Contractor shall comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act, the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, the Florida Civil Rights Act of 1992, and any other federal or state law and County ordinance that prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, age, marital status, disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity.

m. Headings in this Agreement

The headings in this Agreement are for convenience only, confirm no rights or obligations in either of the Parties, and do not alter any terms of this Agreement.

n. Severability

If any term of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, then this Agreement, including all of the remaining terms, shall remain in full force and effect as if such invalid or unenforceable term had never been included.

o. Force Majeure

If either of the Parties is prevented or delayed from performing any obligations under this Agreement (except payment or financial obligations) by circumstances beyond its control, including but not limited to fires, hurricanes, severe weather, floods, pandemics, quarantines, war, civil disturbances, acts of terrorism, acts of God, or significant threats of such circumstances, or any future laws, rules, regulations, orders, or acts of any local, state, or federal government (collectively, "Force Majeure"), then the affected party shall be excused from performance hereunder during the period of the Force Majeure event. The party claiming Force Majeure shall promptly notify the other party in writing upon learning of the existence of a Force Majeure event and when the Force Majeure event has terminated. Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, the term "Force Majeure" does not include or excuse performance under this Agreement for events relating to increased costs associated with fuel, labor, labor disputes, insurance, or other expenses of performing the obligations hereunder.

p. Survival of Obligations

Cancellation, expiration, or early termination of this Agreement shall not relieve the Parties of obligations that by their nature should survive such cancellation, expiration, or termination.

The Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the County, including its officials, officers, employees and agents, from and against any and all claims, damages, liabilities, losses, costs, or suits of any nature whatsoever arising out of, because of, or due to any acts or omissions of the Contractor, its delegates, employees and agents, arising out of or under this Agreement, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs. The County may, at its sole option, defend itself or require the Contractor to provide the defense. The Contractor acknowledges that ten dollars (\$10.00) of the amount paid to the Contractor is sufficient consideration for the Contractor's indemnification of the County.

8. AUDITS, RECORDS, AND RECORDS RETENTION

The Contractor agrees:

- a. To establish and maintain books, records, and documents (including electronic storage media) in accordance with generally accepted accounting procedures and practices which sufficiently and properly reflect all revenues and expenditures of funds paid herein.
- b. To retain all client records, financial records, supporting documents, statistical records,

and any other documents (including electronic storage media) pertinent to this Agreement for a period of five (5) years after termination of the Agreement or, if an audit has been initiated and audit findings have not been resolved at the end of five (5) years, the records shall be retained until resolution of the audit findings or any litigation which may be based on the terms of this Agreement.

- c. Upon completion or termination of the Agreement and at the request of the County, the Contractor will cooperate with the County to facilitate the duplication and transfer of any said records or documents during the required retention period as specified in paragraph b above. The County may reproduce any written materials generated as a result of the Contractor's work.
- d. To assure that all records required to be maintained by the Contractor hereby shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, review, or audit by County, Federal, state, or other personnel duly authorized by the County.
- e. To permit persons duly authorized by the County to have full access to and the right to examine any of the Contractor's records and documents related to this Agreement, regardless of the form in which the records are kept, at all reasonable times for as long as those records are retained.
- f. To include these aforementioned audit and recordkeeping requirements in all approved subcontracts and assignments.
- g. To ensure that any subcontractor providing Services under this Agreement complies with provisions in this Section.
- h. Comply with public records access requirements set forth in section 119.0701(2), Florida Statutes, including the obligation to:
 1. Keep and maintain public records required by the County to perform the Services required under this Agreement.
 2. Upon request from the County's custodian of public records, provide the County with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in Chapter 119, Florida Statutes, or as otherwise provided by law.
 3. Ensure that public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of this Agreement and following termination of the Agreement if the Contractor does not transfer the records to the County.
 4. Upon termination of the Agreement, transfer, at no cost, to the County all public records in possession of the Contractor or keep and maintain public records required by the County to perform the Services required hereunder. If the Contractor transfers all public records to the County upon termination of this Agreement, the Contractor shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements. If the Contractor keeps and maintains public records upon termination of this Agreement, the Contractor shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records. All records stored electronically must be provided to the County, upon request from the County's custodian of public records, in a format that is

compatible with the information technology systems of the County.

5. 9. NOTICE

Upon execution of this Agreement, the Contractor shall provide, in writing, the name of the Contractor's staff member who will be responsible for the submission of all Contractor's records, reports, invoices, and documents to the County necessary for the administration of this Agreement.

10. CONTRACT MANAGEMENT

- a. The Assistant to the County Administrator for Legislative and Strategic Initiatives shall be and is hereby authorized as the representative of the County, responsible for the day to day operational management of the provisions of this Agreement, including all matters related to the payment for lobbying services rendered by the Contractor and its subcontractor hereunder, unless or until a written notice is provided to the Contractor

stating otherwise.

- b. No officer, employee, agent, or representative of the Contractor or its subcontractor shall communicate, in any form or manner, with any County Commissioner or Commissioner's staff regarding any particular matter related to performance under this Agreement. For the purpose of this Section, a Contractor's representative shall include, but not be limited to, the Contractor, its employee, partner, officer, director, consultant, lobbyist, or any actual or potential subcontractor or consultant of the Contractor. The provisions of this Section shall not apply to oral communications or written materials presented at any public proceeding, including any public meetings of the Board of County Commissioners.

11. INSURANCE

For the duration of this Agreement the Contractor shall procure and maintain insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the Services hereunder by the Contractor, its agents, representatives, employees, and subcontractors. The cost of such insurance shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor.

During the term of this Agreement, the Contractor must secure and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance covering all employees and meeting statutory requirements in compliance with applicable state and federal laws. The Contractor shall ensure that any subcontractor providing Services under this Agreement complies with this Section.

12. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

a. Status

The Contractor at all times relevant to this Agreement shall be an independent contractor, and in no event shall the Contractor or any employees, agents, or subcontractors under it be considered to be employees of the County.

b. Conflicting Employment

For the duration of this Agreement, the Contractor shall not enter into any other agreements that would ethically conflict with its obligations under this Agreement. The Contractor shall ensure that any subcontractor providing Services under this Agreement complies with this Section.

c. Registration

The Contractor shall be registered to conduct business with the Florida Department of State prior to execution of this Agreement unless Contractor provides written verification of its exempt status (See applicable sections of Title XXXVI, Chapters 605 through 623, Florida Statutes). During the term of this Agreement, the Contractor shall maintain its registration. Should the Contractor, by reason of revocation, failure to renew, or any other reason, fail to maintain its registration to conduct business, the Contractor shall be in default of this Agreement as of the date such registration expires. The Contractor shall ensure that any subcontractor that performs Services under this Agreement complies with this Section.

d. Assignments

This Agreement shall not be assigned as a whole or in part without the prior written consent of the County, nor shall the Contractor assign any monies due or to become due to it hereunder without the prior written consent of the County.

e. Monitoring

The Contractor shall permit persons duly authorized by the County to inspect any records, papers, documents, facilities, goods, and services of the Contractor which are relevant to this Agreement, and interview any clients and employees of the Contractor to assure the County of the Contractor's satisfactory performance of the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

f. Public Entity Crimes Statement

In accordance with section 287.133, Florida Statutes, Contractor hereby certifies that to the best of its knowledge and belief neither Contractor nor any affiliate has been convicted of a public entity crime. Contractor and its affiliates shall provide the County with a completed public entity crime statement form no later than January 15 of each year this Agreement is in effect. Violation of this section by the Contractor shall be cause for termination of this Agreement by the County.

g. Unauthorized Alien(s) And E-Verify

The Contractor agrees that unauthorized aliens shall not be employed or utilized in the performance of Services under this Agreement. The County shall consider the employment or utilization of unauthorized aliens a violation of Section 274A(e) of the Immigration and Naturalization Act (8 U.S.C. 1324a). Such violation shall be cause for termination of this Agreement by the County.

1. Contractor agrees that it will enroll and participate in the federal E-Verify Program for Employment Verification. Contractor further agrees to provide to the County, within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this Agreement, documentation of such enrollment in the form of a copy of the E-Verify "Edit Company Profile" screen, which contains proof of enrollment in the E-Verify Program (this page can be accessed from the "Edit Company Profile" link on the left navigation menu of the E-Verify employer's homepage).
2. Contractor further agrees that it will require each subcontractor that performs Services under this Agreement to enroll and participate in the E-Verify Program within sixty (60) days of the effective date of this Agreement or within sixty (60) days of the effective date of the contract between the Contractor and the subcontractor, whichever is later. The Contractor shall obtain from the subcontractor a copy of the "Edit Company Profile" screen indicating enrollment in the E-Verify Program and make such record available to the County upon request.
3. Contractor will utilize the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system to verify the employment eligibility of: (i) all persons employed during the term of this Agreement by Contractor to perform employment duties within

Florida; and (ii) all persons (including subcontractors) assigned by Contractor to perform Services pursuant to this Agreement.

(a) Contractor must use E-Verify to initiate verification of employment eligibility for all persons employed during the term of this Agreement by Contractor to perform employment duties within Florida within three (3) business days after the date of hire.

(b) Contractor must initiate verification of each person (including subcontractors) assigned by Contractor to perform Services pursuant to this Agreement within sixty (60) calendar days after the date of execution of this Agreement or within thirty (30) days after assignment to perform Services pursuant to this Agreement, whichever is later.

4. Contractor further agrees to maintain records of its participation and compliance with the provisions of the E-Verify program, including participation by its subcontractors as provided above, and to make such records available to the County or any authorized state entity consistent herewith.

5. Compliance with the terms of this Employment Eligibility Verification provision is made an express condition of this Agreement, and the County may treat a failure of the Contractor to comply as a material breach of this Agreement.

h. Non-Waiver

Failure by the County to enforce or insist upon compliance with any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement or failure to give notice or declare this Agreement terminated shall not constitute a general waiver or relinquishment of the same, or of any other terms, conditions, or acts but the same shall be and remain at all times in full force and effect.

i. Modifications

This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding of the Parties. Any modifications to this Agreement must be in writing and signed by both Parties.

j. Law, Jurisdiction, Venue, Waiver of Jury Trial

This Agreement shall be interpreted and construed in accordance with and governed by the laws of the State of Florida. Venue for all actions arising from, related to, or in connection with this Agreement shall be in the state courts of the Second Judicial Circuit in and for Leon County, Florida. If any claim arising from, related to, or in connection with this Agreement must be litigated in Federal court, the exclusive venue for any such lawsuit shall be in the United States District Court or United States Bankruptcy Court for the Northern District of Florida. By entering into this Agreement, the County and the Contractor hereby expressly waive any rights either of the Parties may have to a trial by jury of any civil litigation matter related to this Agreement.

k. Construction

The validity, construction, and effect of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida.

l. Compliance with Anti-Discrimination Legislation

In providing, or contracting to provide, Services and otherwise performing obligations under this Agreement, the Contractor shall comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act, the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, the Florida Civil Rights Act of 1992, and any other federal or state law and County ordinance that prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, age, marital status, disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity.

m. Headings in this Agreement

The headings in this Agreement are for convenience only, confirm no rights or obligations in either of the Parties, and do not alter any terms of this Agreement.

n. Severability

If any term of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, then this Agreement, including all of the remaining terms, shall remain in full force and effect as if such invalid or unenforceable term had never been included.

o. Force Majeure

If either of the Parties is prevented or delayed from performing any obligations under this Agreement (except payment or financial obligations) by circumstances beyond its control, including but not limited to fires, hurricanes, severe weather, floods, pandemics, quarantines, war, civil disturbances, acts of terrorism, acts of God, or significant threats of such circumstances, or any future laws, rules, regulations, orders, or acts of any local, state, or federal government (collectively, "Force Majeure"), then the affected party shall be excused from performance hereunder during the period of the Force Majeure event. The party claiming Force Majeure shall promptly notify the other party in writing upon learning of the existence of a Force Majeure event and when the Force Majeure event has terminated. Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, the term "Force Majeure" does not include or excuse performance under this Agreement for events relating to increased costs associated with fuel, labor, labor disputes, insurance, or other expenses of performing the obligations hereunder.

p. Survival of Obligations

Cancellation, expiration, or early termination of this Agreement shall not relieve the Parties of obligations that by their nature should survive such cancellation, expiration, or termination.

q. Third Party Beneficiaries

Neither the County nor the Contractor intends to directly or substantially benefit a third party by this Agreement. Therefore, the Parties acknowledge that there are no third-

party beneficiaries to this Agreement, and no third party shall be entitled to assert a right or claim against either of the Parties based upon this Agreement.

r. Counterparts

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, and each executed counterpart shall have the same force and effect as an original instrument.

s. Sovereign Immunity

Nothing herein shall be construed as a waiver of any rights and privileges afforded the County, as a political subdivision of the State of Florida, under section 768.28, Florida Statutes, as amended.

t. Dispute Resolution

1. All disputes arising under or relating to this Agreement shall be resolved in accordance with this Section, except for disputes related to payments, which shall be addressed and resolved in accordance with Section 5.

2. The Parties shall attempt to resolve all disputes that arise under this Agreement in good faith and in accordance with the following procedure:

(a) The aggrieved party shall give written notice to the other party, using the contact information listed in Section 9 of this Agreement, setting forth the nature of the dispute, date of occurrence (if known), and proposed equitable resolution.

(b) If the representatives listed in Section 9 are unable to reconcile the dispute, they shall report their impasse to the County Administrator, or authorized representative, and the Contractor's designee, who, at their earliest opportunity, shall review and attempt to resolve the dispute.

(c) If the County Administrator and the Contractor's designee are not able to amicably resolve the dispute within fifteen (15) business days after the impasse is reported to them, then either party can pursue whatever forms of relief may be available to it under this Agreement, at law, or in equity.

u. Attorneys' Fees and Costs

In the event of a dispute arising under this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover its reasonable attorneys' fees and costs, including attorneys' fees and costs incurred in litigating entitlement to attorneys' fees and costs, as well as in determining or quantifying the amount of recoverable attorneys' fees and costs. The reasonable costs to which the prevailing party is entitled shall include costs that are taxable under any applicable statute, rule, or guideline, as well as non-taxable costs, including, but not limited to, costs of investigation, copying costs, electronic discovery costs, telephone charges, mailing and delivery charges, information technology support charges, consultant and expert witness fees, travel expenses, court reporter fees, and mediator fees, regardless of whether such costs are otherwise taxable.

v. Joint Preparation

The Parties have jointly prepared this Agreement, and this Agreement shall not be construed more strictly against either of the Parties.

ATTACHMENT # 1: FEDERAL LOBBYING AND GRANT WRITING SERVICES

The Contractor shall assist in the development, proposal, and sponsorship of federal bills/amendments and seek federal appropriations to further the County's policy goals and priorities as needed. In addition, the Contractor shall assist Leon County Government in researching and identifying potential federal grants to support the County's priority programs, projects, and initiatives. The Contractor shall provide general grant writing and management services associated with the completion and submission of grant applications. The Contractor will work closely with the County's liaison, designee(s), and other County contract lobbyists (as applicable) in the development and ongoing implementation of the program and will provide, at a minimum, the following services (collectively, the "Services"):

1. Work with County staff to assess the County's funding priority areas as established by the Board of County Commissioners and identify viable federal funding sources to support these priorities.
2. Provide general grant proposal writing services associated with completion of limited, strategic grant applications on behalf of the County, including the preparation of funding abstracts, production, and timely submittal of applications to funding sources. The Contractor shall provide a copy of each grant application package submitted for funding, in its entirety, to the County's legislative affairs liaison.
3. Advocate with Congress, congressional committees, and federal agencies in support of the County's goals, priorities, and projects, and attend meetings as necessary in relation to these Services.
4. Monitor current federal legislation and the federal budget process and report to the County, both orally and in writing, any legislative events that may directly or indirectly impact the County.
5. Provide advice and interpretation on legislative and regulatory matters as they apply to County programs, projects, or operations. Such information may involve federal laws as well as state and local statutes and ordinances insofar as they may be affected by federal actions.
6. Provide options regarding legislative strategy when necessary.
7. Provide the County with monthly written reports on legislative, administrative, and budgetary priorities as established by the Board of County Commissioners and other legislative or administrative actions that may impact the County.
8. Coordinate meetings for elected officials and/or staff with appropriate federal agencies, legislative staff, and elected officials to communicate the County's interests, concerns, needs, etc. as needed.
9. Testify before legislative committees and/or regulatory bodies on behalf of the County as needed.
10. At the Contractor's expense, attend a meeting of the Leon County Board of County Commissioners at least once a year to update the Board of County Commissioners on federal issues that are affecting the County.

Subject: Federal Legislative and Regulatory Action Relevant to General State and Local Government Interests

This report provides a comprehensive update for local governments and their partners, highlighting actions on notable federal legislation, Administration, and regulatory issues since our last update in June. It is important to note that this memorandum provides only a high-level perspective; detailed reports were provided as events unfolded in Congress and the Biden Administration.

After a six-week summer recess, Congress returns this week to face a familiar problem: how to avert a government shutdown. And it has just three weeks to do so, as the 2024 fiscal year ends on September 30. This perennial problem is intensified in a Presidential election year and particularly this year, since one of the candidates, former President Donald Trump, is urging Republicans to force a shutdown unless certain demands are met.

On Wednesday, Speaker of the House Mike Johnson (R-LA) pulled from the floor a Continuing Resolution (CR) to extend federal funding until March 28, 2025. Unrelated legislation had been added to the CR that would require voters to show proof of citizenship before registering to vote in federal elections. (Noncitizen voting is already illegal in federal races and the addition of this requirement could wreak havoc on states' ability to run elections.) It was clear that the Speaker did not have the votes to pass the CR, and he has said that he needs time over the weekend to "build consensus" for the legislation.

Democrats prefer a "clean" continuing resolution that extends until just after the November elections, which would allow lawmakers to resolve the funding bills in a lame duck session of Congress, as well as having the new Administration take office unfettered by an early funding fight.

In addition to the funding deadline, Congress has until September 20 to address a \$3 billion shortfall for the Department of Veterans Affairs. If Congress does not act, veteran compensation and pension benefits could be delayed.

Meanwhile, the Farm Bill technically expires on September 30, meaning it will need an extension either as part of the continuing resolution or in some other legislative vehicle. The National Flood Insurance Program is in a similar situation. The national defense authorization measure is also awaiting action, although that needs to be passed by the end of the year and will likely be finalized in a lame duck session. Other issues which could come up in September or in the lame duck session could include an impeachment effort against President Joe Biden, votes on infertility treatments like IVF legislation, anti-China legislation, and approval of judicial nominees.

ISSUE AREA REVIEW AND FORECASTS

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APPROPRIATIONS

FY 2025 APPROPRIATIONS

Prior to the August recess, the House Appropriations Committee approved all 12 of its FY 2025 spending bills along party lines, but only five were passed by the full chamber: Defense; Homeland Security; Interior-Environment; Military Construction-VA; and State-Foreign Operations. The Legislative Branch bill failed a floor vote in July and the Energy & Water bill was pulled from floor consideration later in the month. Subsequently, leadership scrapped votes on the remaining FY 2025 bills (Agriculture-FDA, Financial Services, Labor-HHS-Education, Commerce-Justice-Science, and Transportation-Housing).

The Senate Appropriations Committee approved all but one of its FY 2025 spending bills this summer with bipartisan votes. Following the attempted assassination of former President Trump, the committee pulled the FY 2025 Homeland Security spending bill from its markup calendar to revisit funding and related policy for the Secret Service. While the committee has yet to release its September schedule, it could take up the bill this month.

With limited time to act before the October 1 start of the federal fiscal year, Congress immediately turned its attention to an FY 2025 Continuing Resolution (CR) upon its return from the August recess. Speaker Johnson unveiled a stopgap funding bill that would fund the government at largely current levels through March 28, 2025. The Speaker intended to bring the bill up for a vote in the House today, but several Republican House Members came out in opposition to the bill over the last two days, primarily because of the funding levels and detrimental impact of a relatively lengthy CR on the Defense Department. As such, the Speaker pulled the bill, while he continues “consensus-building” within the House GOP conference, aiming to bring up the bill next week.

As drafted, the proposed CR includes \$10 billion to boost FEMA’s disaster aid fund, depleted after hurricanes in Texas and Florida, along with West Coast wildfires and severe storms across the Midwest and Northeast. Republicans also included nearly \$2 billion for Navy submarines; a total requested by the White House. The measure also extends the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) program, the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program, the Tenant-Based Rental Assistance Program, and the National Flood Insurance Program through the duration of the CR. Notably, the House CR does not include a Farm Bill extension, funding to rebuild the Francis Scott Key Bridge in Baltimore, or \$12 billion in White House-requested funds to fill a gap in veterans’ health care funding (although a separate bill to address veterans’ health benefits is under consideration).

As expected, Speaker Johnson also attached the *Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act* to the CR, per the endorsement of former President Trump and far-right conservatives. The SAVE Act would require proof of citizenship to register to vote in a federal election, although it is already illegal for non-citizens to cast ballots.

In a “Dear Colleague” letter circulated Sunday, Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) said his chamber would seek to pass a CR free from “poison pills or Republican extremism” to keep the federal government open ahead of an end-of-the-month deadline. As such, the leader will reportedly introduce a CR that extends federal funding through mid-December, a timeline supported by the White House, Congressional Democrats, and Republican appropriators, including the Senate committee’s Ranking Member, Senator Susan Collins (R-ME).

EDUCATION

FISCAL YEAR (FY) 2025 APPROPRIATIONS

In early July, the House Appropriations Committee approved the Fiscal Year 2025 Labor-HHS-Education (“Labor-H”) Appropriations [bill](#) with significant cuts to federal education programs compared to prior fiscal years. The proposal would eliminate 17 education programs, including funds for English language learning, teacher training, and childcare on college campuses while increasing support for charter schools and early education programs like Head Start. Additionally, the bill includes a \$4.7 billion cut to the Title I grant program. The proposal to cut \$10 million from the Office for Civil Rights, amid disagreements over the department’s Title IX rule, drew criticism from Democrats, who argued it would hinder efforts to address discrimination cases, including antisemitism.

The bill also includes language that would block the Department of Education from implementing and enforcing its regulations on income-driven repayment, borrower defense, gainful employment, and its Title IX regulations. The legislation also included federal funding restrictions for schools allowing transgender students to participate in women’s sports.

However, Speaker Johnson and House Republican leadership punted several spending bills up for floor consideration, including the Labor-HHS bill. Lawmakers had initially planned to bring the bill to the floor at the end of July; however, concerns around the number of votes needed to pass upcoming spending bills left the passage of the Labor-HHS bill as a standalone uncertainty. In the previous appropriations cycle, Labor-HHS did not go to the floor as a standalone bill. Nearly 200 amendments have been [submitted](#) to the House Rules Committee on the legislation.

In the Senate, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed its version of the [bill](#) on August 1. The upper chamber’s version would: provide \$80 billion in discretionary funding for the Department of Education. Notably, the bill would also give a \$35 million increase in state grants for Career and Technical Education (CTE); increase the maximum Pell Grant award by \$100; increase funding for various post-secondary education grant programs; and include an additional \$100 million for the administration of student aid over the fiscal year 2024. The language on controversial education issues included in the House bill and report has been stripped out in the Senate.

STUDENT DEBT RELIEF

Income-Driven Repayment (IDR)

Set to be completed in October, President Biden’s Saving on a Valuable Education (SAVE) income-driven repayment plan remains embroiled in court challenges. In late June, two federal judges in Kansas and Missouri blocked the implementation of several portions of the \$150 billion plan. The White House appealed both rulings. However, in July, three Republican-appointed judges for the 8th Circuit Court of Appeals blocked the entire loan repayment plan for an unknown amount of time. The Biden Administration had asked the Supreme Court to lift this injunction, arguing it was overly broad and impacted borrowers with no connection to the lawsuits.

On August 28, the Supreme Court denied a request to reinstate the loan repayment program. In an unsigned order, the court said, “The Court expects that the Court of Appeals will render its decision with appropriate dispatch.”

On September 3, seven Republican-led states—Missouri, Georgia, Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, North Dakota, and Ohio—filed a lawsuit to block the plan before it is finalized. The states argue that the Biden Administration is unlawfully attempting to cancel billions of dollars in student loans. This preemptive lawsuit, filed in the Southern District Court of Georgia, is an unusual attempt to halt a rule before it is finalized. The Department of Education declined to comment on the pending litigation. This lawsuit is the latest in a series of legal challenges to Biden’s student debt relief initiatives following the Supreme Court’s rejection of his loan forgiveness plan and other stalled efforts.

Legal challenges against the SAVE Plan will continue to progress through the appeals courts, determining the program’s future. While the plan remains in court, the White House has paused payments for about eight million enrolled borrowers, leaving many students in limbo regarding repayment schedules.

Student Aid Administration

On August 7, the Department of Education announced another delay in releasing the revamped Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form, pushing the deadline to December 1. This follows previous challenges the department faced in overhauling the form, with last year’s technical issues causing months of delays and problems for students applying for financial aid. To mitigate these risks, the department will release a test version to select students and schools by October 1, with more to follow in November. While advocacy groups supported the delay to ensure a functioning system, some lawmakers criticized the move, warning that further delays could hinder students’ ability to make college decisions.

TITLE IX

President Biden’s expanded Title IX rule has also been subject to recurring legal challenges since its release. The rule expands discrimination protections to include gender identity, sexual orientation, and pregnancy status while revising Trump-era policies on handling sexual misconduct in schools. Blocked in over a dozen states and challenged by Republican attorneys general who argue it violates the original intent of Title IX, particularly concerning single-sex spaces and women’s sports, the rule’s enforcement remains in jeopardy.

However, in July, the Department of Education [announced](#) it would start enforcing its Title IX anti-discrimination rule despite early court losses that blocked the regulation. The Office for Civil Rights released resources for schools to help them draft and implement new nondiscrimination policies before the rule takes effect on August 1. Schools in states with injunctions will continue following the 2020 Trump-era rule while others prepare to comply with the new rule.

The Administration asked the Supreme Court to allow enforcement of most of the new rule, excluding gender identity provisions, to avoid inconsistent policies nationwide. On August 16, the Supreme Court rejected this request, leaving in place decisions by federal appeals courts. Decided on a 5-4 divide, the high court argued that the Biden Administration had “not provided this Court a sufficient basis to disturb the lower courts’” findings that the challenged gender identity and sex discrimination protections were “intertwined with and affect other provisions of the rule.”

On July 11, House Republicans voted to block the Title IX rule, echoing concerns that the rule undermines women’s sports and privacy in single-sex spaces. The resolution ([H.J. Res. 165](#)) passed 210-205. The resolution is unlikely to advance in the Democrat-controlled Senate, and President Biden has affirmed that he will veto the measure if it comes to his desk.

OTHER LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY

On June 20, Democratic lawmakers introduced the Pell Grant Preservation and Expansion Act ([S. 4595](#)), a bicameral bill that would double the maximum Pell Grant award size, index the cap to inflation, and expand the program for low-income students. The bill, introduced by Sens. Hirono (D-HI), Murray (D-WA), Reed (D-RI), and Whitehouse (D-RI) in the Senate and Reps. Pocan (D-WI) and Scott (D-VA) in the House would increase the maximum Pell Grant award to \$10,000 for the 2025-2026 year, phasing in further increases over the next five years to raise it to \$14,000; the current maximum stands at \$7,395. The legislation would also make the program mandatory to avoid any funding shortfalls. Notably, the Congressional Budget Office [released](#) its baseline projections for the Pell Grant program the week of introduction, estimating that the program will have a \$11.4 billion surplus for Fiscal Year 2025. The legislation has been referred to the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP) and the House Education and Workforce Committee, respectively, but it likely faces strong opposition in the House.

On July 26, House Republicans, led by Education and the Workforce Chair Virginia Foxx (R-NC), [issued](#) a subpoena to Education Secretary Miguel Cardona, compelling him to hand over documents related to the problematic rollout of the federal student aid form. Chair Foxx accused the Department of Education of obstructing Congressional inquiries and a Government Accountability Office (GAO) investigation into the new simplified FAFSA issues. The department dismissed the subpoena as a “political stunt” and stated it has been communicating with Congress through weekly meetings and providing updates and documents. However, Chair Foxx and Ranking Member of the Senate Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions Committee Bill Cassidy (R-LA) have criticized the department for not fully cooperating with the GAO and delaying investigations. GAO Comptroller General Gene Dodaro indicated that delays by the department have impacted the GAO’s ability to meet its expected timeframe for issuing findings. “Though GAO has received some information and documents, many pending requests remain with the Department over four months later,” wrote Chair Foxx.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION RULEMAKING

Unified Agenda

The Biden Administration released its Spring 2024 Unified Agenda, outlining key regulatory priorities and expected timelines. The Department of Education plans to finalize its student debt relief [rule](#) by October. It aims to forgive unpaid interest for 25 million borrowers and assist millions who have struggled with long-term debt or failed to enroll in existing programs. Additionally, a proposed [rule](#) for borrowers facing hardship is expected by September, which may include automatic forgiveness for those at high risk of default and others with significant medical or caregiving expenses. Furthermore, a Title VI [rule](#) addressing harassment and discrimination based on ancestry or ethnic characteristics is back on the agenda after delays, but the anticipated Title IX sports eligibility [rule](#) has been moved to long-term action without a set deadline.

ENERGY/ENVIRONMENT/WATER

PERMITTING REFORM

On July 22, Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee Chair Joe Manchin (I-WV) and Ranking Member John Barrasso (R-WY) unveiled the *Energy Permitting Reform Act of 2024*. Broadly, the bipartisan legislation aims to accomplish the following objectives: (1) shortened litigation timelines on all types of federal authorizations for energy and mineral projects; (2) accelerated leading and permitting decisions for all types of energy projects; (3) ensuring that critical minerals projects can use federal land for mine support activities by establishing a new mill site claim; (4) establishment of a 90-day deadline for DOE to grant or deny LNG export applications; and (5) the setting of various standards on interstate electric transmission projects.

Although the *Energy Permitting Reform Act of 2024* is unlikely to become law in its current form, widely supported bipartisan portions of the proposal may be included in must-pass legislation in the lame duck session. Additionally, the House counterpart version of the bill is likely to be led by House Natural Resources Committee Chair Bruce Westerman (R-AR), who described his bill as complementary to the Senate bill, though his version is more focused on changes to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).

PER- AND POLYFLUOROALKYL SUBSTANCES (PFAS)

Congress has maintained its focus on PFAS through legislative proposals included in the FY 2025 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) as well as the FY 2025 appropriations bills. Even though most legislative action will be stalled until after the November elections, the uptick in PFAS-related amendments indicates PFAS' significance may grow in the forthcoming 119th Congress.

Although the majority of the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) regulatory actions addressing per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) were concluded in the first half of 2024 ahead of the Congressional Review Act (CRA) window, rules promulgated by the EPA will require significant action in 2024 and 2025. A preview of these upcoming developments is provided below.

Agency Action

The EPA has taken several steps to implement regulatory commitments identified in the 2021 PFAS Strategic Road Map. However, some of these regulations are being challenged in court, thereby impeding their implementation. The following list outlines relevant rulemaking developments and lists upcoming deadlines for the latter half of 2024 and throughout 2025.

1. **Safe Drinking Water Act: National Primary Drinking Water Regulation.** Back in April 2024, the EPA issued a final rule, the PFAS National Primary Drinking Water Regulation Rulemaking (NPDWR), establishing legally enforceable levels, called Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCLs), for six PFAS in drinking water. The EPA also finalized health-based, non-enforceable Maximum Contaminant Level Goals (MCLGs) for these PFAS. Nevertheless, the EPA's NPDWR under the SDWA is currently being challenged by parties who argue that the EPA exceeded its authority under the SDWA. Unless the NPDWR is upheld, its implementation will be stalled.
2. **National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System.** If the NPDWR is upheld, it will impact the development of effluent limits under National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES)

permits. According to the EPA's Spring 2024 Agency Rule List, it expects to issue a proposed rule in June 2025 to update the NPDES application regulations.

3. **Final Rule Designating PFOA and PFOS as 'Hazardous Substances' Under CERCLA.** On May 8, EPA published its final rule designating two PFAS compounds – PFOA and PFOS – as “hazardous substances” under CERCLA. This final rule had an effective date of July 8; nevertheless, there is ongoing litigation challenging the CERCLA designation on the grounds that the EPA exceeded its statutory authority under the Administrative Procedure Act (APA). Thus, implementation of the obligations required by the EPA's final rule – including reporting requirements and designation of clean-up costs – will be stalled.
4. **Toxics Releases Inventory.** On September 4, the EPA announced a direct final rule delaying the reporting period for their October 2023 final rule, which changed reporting requirements for PFAS listed in the Toxics Release Inventory (TRI), as directed by the FY 2020 NDAA. The reporting period was originally scheduled to begin on November 12; however, the September final rule delays the beginning of the reporting period until July 2025 due to resource constraints. Most reporting parties would be required to complete all reporting by January 11, 2026. Small businesses reporting data solely on importing PFAS contained in articles will have until July 11, 2026, to submit reports.

WATER RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT ACT (WRDA)

Lawmakers from both chambers passed their versions of the 2024 Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) before leaving town for the August recess. On July 22, the House passed their version of the bill, [H.R. 8812](#), by a bipartisan vote of 359-13, under a suspension of the rules, a procedure typically reserved for noncontroversial legislation. On August 1, the Senate unanimously passed its version of the bill, [S. 4367](#), using expedited procedures to bypass the amendment process and other procedural steps.

Notably, both the House and Senate's WRDA bills remain narrowly focused on Army Corps of Engineers projects such as harbors, locks, dams, and ecosystem restoration projects, avoiding controversial proposals to include policy changes at the EPA or other agencies.

FARM BILL/NUTRITION PROGRAMS

The current Farm Bill is set to expire on September 30, and lawmakers from both parties remain at an impasse over negotiations for a new one. In May, Senate Democrats and House Republicans introduced competing Farm Bill proposals aimed at reauthorizing, updating, and funding critical agriculture and food programs - including the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) - through 2029. By June, Senate Republicans unveiled their own proposal, which closely aligns with the House Republican framework. While House Republicans have advanced their version through committee, it has yet to be considered on the floor. The Senate has not yet taken any committee-level action on any proposal. Given the current gridlock, lawmakers are expected to pass a one-year extension to allow more time for negotiations. They are now debating whether to include this extension in a stopgap funding measure in September or to address it during the lame-duck session in November.

HEALTHCARE

FY 2025 APPROPRIATIONS

On July 10, the House Appropriations Committee advanced its version of the fiscal year (FY) 2025 Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education (LHHS) Appropriations bill ([H.R. 9029](#)). The House legislation includes approximately \$107 billion in discretionary funding for the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), a decrease of seven percent over FY 2024 enacted levels. Of note to local governments, the House bill proposes approximately \$4 billion for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), \$7.4 billion for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), and \$2.5 billion for the Administration for Community Living (ACL), including \$1 billion for senior nutrition.

On August 1, the Senate Appropriations Committee advanced its version of the FY 2025 LHHS Appropriations bill ([S. 4942](#)). The Senate legislation provides \$122.8 billion in discretionary funding for HHS. Of interest to local governments, the Senate bill includes approximately \$4.125 billion for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), \$7.5 billion for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), and \$2.5 billion for the Administration for Community Living (ACL). Both the House and Senate LHHS appropriations bill await floor consideration.

DRUG PRICING

On August 20, HHS announced \$1.4 billion in [funding](#) for the Health Resources and Services Administration's (HRSA) AIDS Drug Assistance Program. The funding will provide financial assistance to certain low-income individuals for the cost of medication, co-pays and co-insurance as well as health premiums for health insurance that covers HIV medication. Earlier, on August 15, HHS published a [press release](#) announcing price agreements for the first ten drugs under the Medicare Drug Price Negotiation Program. Additional information is available [here](#).

HEALTH LEGISLATION

On July 31, the Senate Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP) Committee advanced three health care bills, including the *Older Americans Act Reauthorization Act of 2024* ([S. 4776](#)) to reauthorize certain grant programs for senior citizen nutrition and social programs. The Committee also advanced legislation to increase funding for federal autism programs and research ([S. 4762](#)) and legislation to reauthorize Centers for Disease Control and Prevention traumatic brain injury programs ([S. 4755](#)).

On July 24, the House Ways and Means Committee advanced the *Protecting America's Children by Strengthening Families Act* ([H.R. 9076](#)), which would reauthorize child welfare programs under the Social Security Act through 2029.

MEDICAID

On July 9, the final rule "Ensuring Access to Medicaid Services" came into effect. This [rule](#), released in May, intends to improve access to care, quality of care, and health outcomes for Medicaid beneficiaries across fee-for-service (FFS) and managed care delivery systems, including home- and community-based services (HCBS) provided through those delivery systems. Major provisions of this rule include: at least 80% of all Medicaid payments for specific HCBS — homemaker services, home health aide services, and personal care

services — must be spent on compensation for direct care workers to help address the direct care workforce crisis; states must report information on HCBS waiting lists; states must demonstrate that, as part of person-centered planning, a reassessment of need is completed at least once a year for people continuously enrolled in HCBS programs; states must manage a grievance process; and states must report on a set of national standardized quality measures formulated by CMS.

During the Democratic National Convention in August, Democrats rolled out their 2024 platform, which included Democrats' commitment to expanding Medicaid, and touted Biden's plan to limit renewals for kids younger than six years old to three years. Extending Medicaid renewal periods for children beyond 12 months has become a popular policy change among states. It also emphasizes the Democrats' goal to ensure equal access to the program in the territories, including the potential construction of a state-of-the-art medical complex in Guam that co-locates health agencies and greater reimbursement for migration costs for the territories.

FENTANYL

The Biden Administration continues to face criticism from both progressives and industry officials over its efforts to combat the fentanyl crisis, with many criticizing its failure to address the de minimis "loophole." This loophole allows low-cost goods, primarily from China, to enter the U.S. duty-free, a pathway some believe is exploited by drug traffickers. While President Biden called on Congress to take action and signed a national security memo to improve coordination among federal agencies, critics like Rep. Earl Blumenauer (D-OR) insist that more is needed, advocating for legislation to close the de minimis gap entirely. Meanwhile, the Administration has proposed measures to increase documentation requirements for shipments, though critics argue this does not go far enough. Advocates for the de minimis program, however, defend it as crucial for trade, emphasizing that most fentanyl is smuggled across the border by individuals, not through small-value shipments.

ABORTION

The Supreme Court produced several notable decisions this quarter on abortion challenges. On June 13, the court delivered a unanimous decision rejecting anti-abortion plaintiffs' challenge of the Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) eased access to the abortion drug mifepristone, stating that the plaintiffs lacked standing but never reaching the legality of the FDA's decision to loosen restrictions.

On June 27, the Supreme Court dismissed a case over whether Idaho's restrictive abortion ban conflicts with the *Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act* (EMTALA) without ruling on whether the federal law preempts all state abortion bans. The narrow decision sparked backlash from both sides of the debate. On September 3, the Supreme Court also declined to block President Biden's family planning rules in Oklahoma, which had lost millions in federal family planning grants by refusing to provide information about abortion to patients who request it.

On July 26, the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit ruled that a group of six states - Idaho, Montana, Nebraska, South Carolina, Texas, and Utah - did not have standing to sue over FDA policy changes to make mifepristone more available. The court argued that the states cannot claim a legal interest in individual patients' health or continued pregnancies. However, Republican-led challenges are likely to persist as attorneys general attempt to find a solid legal argument for the restriction of the drug. Notably, Idaho joined with Missouri and Kansas on another case originating in a Texas federal court, giving

the high court another pathway to rule on a separate legal argument - possibly after the 2024 presidential election - that the FDA overstepped by relaxing the conditions for mifepristone availability.

In Congress, FY 2025 appropriations stalled at the end of July when the House of Representatives failed to bring the FDA-Agriculture spending bill to the chamber floor, citing the same policy rider issues that blocked floor consideration of the bill last year. According to POLITICO reporting, the bill was dropped from immediate floor consideration because of objections to policies on abortion and other issues from moderate Republicans. The House Financial Services spending bill also never made it to the floor before Congress departed, reportedly due to a policy rider that would block a Washington, DC law preventing employers from discriminating against workers who seek contraception or other family planning services.

On the campaign trail, former President Trump has been distancing himself from former positions on abortion bans and access to mifepristone following Democrats' pressure to make abortion a central issue of the 2024 election. In his June debate against President Biden, Trump stated that he agreed with the Supreme Court's decision not to restrict access to the abortion drug mifepristone and would not block access to the medication during a second presidential term. He has also mentioned to reporters this month that he would be open to FDA policies that supplement state policies on abortion. Trump has also reversed his position on his home state of Florida's ban on abortion after six weeks of pregnancy, claiming it was too strict, and stated that his government would cover the cost of in vitro fertilization (IVF) if elected. The Harris-Walz campaign has publicly dismissed these claims as "empty words," and Democrats made abortion a central issue in their programming during the Democratic National Convention in July.

HOUSING/COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

HOUSING SUPPLY

During [remarks](#) on June 24, Department of the Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen highlighted a number of new and ongoing efforts to lower U.S. housing costs and increase the supply of affordable housing across the country. Secretary Yellen noted certain positive signs related to shelter inflation, including that the number of total housing units under construction is at a 50-year high, but acknowledged that the current housing environment has led to a supply crunch and an affordability crunch for U.S. families. Secretary Yellen emphasized the importance of federal support for housing development, reiterating the Biden Administration's commitment to improving U.S. housing costs and supply through the Housing Supply Action Plan, which has enabled state, local, and federal collaboration to finance housing construction, prevent evictions, and better leverage federal funding for use in housing development. She also highlighted the importance of tax-based solutions to these housing problems, calling on Congress to provide tax credits for first-time homebuyers and specifically urging the Senate to pass the bipartisan tax package that would expand the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit and would help to build and preserve over two million homes across the U.S. Secretary Yellen referred to the availability of stable and affordable rental housing and homeownership as a "linchpin of the American Dream," explaining that efforts to stabilize housing will pay a variety of economic dividends for Americans.

A press release in advance of the Secretary's remarks noted the success of ongoing Treasury efforts to address the long-term increase in housing costs, including through Treasury's Emergency Rental Assistance program and Homeowner Assistance Fund. It emphasized the importance of continued efforts to support housing lending by community lenders and state and local HFAs and to support new housing

construction through mechanisms including tax incentives and fiscal recovery programs, such as the use of State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF).

On August 13, the White House highlighted a number of new actions to increase housing supply and lower housing costs in the U.S. Among the actions and initiatives included in the White House [fact sheet](#) were:

- A \$100 million [funding opportunity](#) under the Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) Pathways to Removing Obstacles to Housing (PRO Housing) program, which will provide communities with funding to facilitate development of affordable housing through identification and removal of barriers to housing production and preservation. This funding opportunity follows HUD's June 26 [announcement](#) of \$85 million in PRO Housing grant awards to over 20 communities across the U.S.
- A [collaboration](#) between HUD and the Department of the Treasury to increase certainty of interest rates for local Housing Finance Agencies (HFAs) that utilize the Federal Housing Administration's (FHA) risk sharing initiative through the Federal Financing Bank (FFB) Multifamily Risk Sharing Program. By implementing a floor and cap on benchmark Treasury interest rates used to calculate the all-in rate for HFAs, this will increase certainty around post-construction period interest rates, reducing costs for borrowers and making more potential housing developments financially viable. This effort follows the indefinite extension of the Risk Sharing Program earlier this year.
- Issuance of new Department of Transportation (DOT) [guidance](#) clarifying the potential eligibility of Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (TIFIA) and Railroad Rehabilitation and Improvement Financing (RRIF) loans used for commercial-to-residential conversions or housing expansion projects near transit options for categorical exclusions under the NEPA. The guidance provides additional clarifications around financing options supported by these loans.
- [Proposal](#) of a new tool by the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) to accelerate reviews of potential housing projects impacting historical sites under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act. The potential tool, which is not yet finalized, would exempt activities including interior repairs, most solar panel installations, and climate-friendly transportation activities from requirements for assessment, avoidance, minimization, and mitigation of a project's potential adverse impacts on historical sites. This update would accelerate the investment of billions of dollars in federal funding supported by the Biden Administration Investing in America Agenda.
- Launch of a new HUD Legacy Challenge which will provide up to \$250 million in low-cost, low-interest loan financing through the Section 108 Loan Guarantee Program to communities that directly receive Community Development Block Grants. Eligible funding uses include commercial-to-residential conversions, housing rehabilitation, adaptive reuse, and rehabilitation of infrastructure enabling housing such as water and sewer lines. Additional flexibilities will be provided to communities that express interest by November 1.

The fact sheet also highlighted anticipated efforts, including finalization of a HUD rule updating Manufactured Home Construction and Safety Standards and efforts to encourage state and local governments to expedite permitting and approvals for new housing development projects.

RENTER PROTECTIONS

On July 12, the Federal Housing Finance Agency (FHFA) [announced](#) a rule to benefit millions of U.S. renters, requiring landlords with federally-backed mortgages to enact a suite of tenant protections. Effective February 28, 2025, the rule will require these landlords to provide a five-day grace period on late rent payments, provide 30-day written notice of rent increases, and provide 30-day written notice of lease expiration. Freddie Mac and Fannie May will monitor compliance with these requirements, which will apply to new or refinanced loans signed after the effective date.

The following week at a campaign event in Nevada, President Biden called on members of Congress to pass legislation that would require landlords with over 50 rental units to either cap annual rent increases on existing units at five percent annually or lose federal tax breaks based on property depreciation. The proposal would impact an estimated 20 million rental units across the country, and received criticism from some economists, landlord associations, and real estate groups, while tenant advocacy organizations and progressive groups lauded Biden's proposal. Regardless of this debate, it is unlikely that the plan would be enacted this year as Congress focuses on a narrow suite of must-pass and priority legislative initiatives leading into the November elections and the lame duck session.

LOW INCOME HOUSING TAX CREDIT

On August 1, the Senate rejected a bipartisan, House-passed bill that would have restored and expanded certain tax credits, including an expansion of the low-income housing tax credit. While the bill was largely popular, Republican concerns around child tax credit expansion stalled the bill. Along with a majority of Senate Republicans, Sen. Joe Manchin of West Virginia, Sen. Bernie Sanders of Vermont, and Majority Leader Chuck Schumer ended up opposing the bill, which would allow the majority leader to potentially bring the bill back up for another vote in the Senate before the election or during the lame duck session. After the failed vote, Sen. Maria Cantwell (D-WA) introduced a separate measure to break off the low-income housing tax credit from the rest of the package in an effort to promote renewed consideration of the expansion in the lame duck session.

HOUSING AND CLIMATE

On August 14, in collaboration with the White House and the interagency National Heat Health Information System (NIHHIS), HUD [issued](#) the first-ever [National Heat Strategy for 2024-2030](#). The strategy provides a whole-of-government plan to respond to increasingly dangerous extreme heat in communities across the country through federal agency development of science-based solutions to reduce the impact of extreme heat. This strategy also aims to facilitate coordination between federal agencies on heat planning, response, and resilience.

The release of this strategy follows additional HUD efforts to protect residents from extreme heat. These efforts include the [issuance](#) of new guidance to Public Housing Agencies (PHAs) in June. This guidance provides additional options to PHAs to increase utility allowances for residents or waive surcharges for cooling to provide families with relief from periods of severe or extreme heat and is expected to mitigate the impacts of extreme heat for nearly two million Americans. Also in June, HUD [released](#) its updated [Climate Adaptation Plan](#) alongside 20 other federal agencies, establishing protocols to integrate climate resilience efforts into housing funding opportunities. This update to the Adaptation Plans, initially released in 2021, is based on progress towards adaptation goals, broadened mission focus, historical data and climate projections, and linking climate adaptation efforts to other Administration priorities.

HOMELESSNESS FUNDING

On July 22, HUD [announced](#) the availability of \$175 million in one-time Continuum of Care (CoC) awards through the [CoC Builds Notice of Funding Opportunity](#) (NOFO). This NOFO will provide funding for new construction, acquisition, or rehabilitation of permanent supportive rental housing for persons experiencing homelessness. The deadline for applications under this NOFO is November 21.

On July 31, HUD [announced](#) the availability of over \$3.5 billion in competitive funding through the CoC Program. This two-year [funding opportunity](#) will provide federal grant funding to homeless services and housing support programs serving persons experiencing homelessness across the U.S. The funding will also include a cost-of-living adjustment to allow CoCs to better keep up with rising costs. This will streamline the application process by requiring submission of only one CoC application for consideration for Fiscal Year 2024 and 2025 funding. The deadline for submission of CoC consolidated applications and project applications by interested communities is October 30.

IMMIGRATION/HOMELAND SECURITY/PUBLIC SAFETY

THE BORDER AND PRESIDENTIAL POLITICS

The border remains at the forefront of the presidential election, with former President Donald Trump criticizing Vice President Kamala Harris for the Biden Administration's "failed" border policies and Democrats highlighting the bipartisan border [agreement](#) that was thwarted by Senate Republicans at Trump's urging.

Border crossings have significantly fallen since June, when President Biden issued a [Presidential Proclamation](#) strengthening entry standards for migrants seeking asylum. Specifically, his actions allowed the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and other relevant federal agencies to prohibit asylum seekers from entering the U.S. when the seven-day average of daily border crossings between points of entry exceeds 2,500. When this threshold is reached, border officials must halt credible fear screenings and expel any foreign nationals seeking to enter the U.S. outside a designated port of entry. Expelled migrants are then barred from seeking reentry for a minimum of five years. Notably, these asylum restrictions do not apply to unaccompanied minors or migrants fleeing persecution or torture.

The Biden Administration also implemented enforcement measures to disrupt smuggling networks and human trafficking, including revoking visas for Nicaraguan government officials and representatives from companies that provide transportation services for migrants. DHS and the Justice Department also committed to accelerating the resolution of cases pertaining to recently arrived migrants, with the objective of rapidly deporting asylum seekers who are found not to have a credible fear claim.

TAX

Democrats and Republicans continue to formulate their respective tax policy positions prior to the expiration of the *Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017* in 2025. Since our last update, Vice President Kamala Harris unveiled portions of her tax policy platform for the upcoming 2024 presidential election. Major proposals include an increase in the corporate income tax rate to 28 percent from 25 percent, an increase in the capital gains tax rate for high-income individuals, and increased tax deductions for certain “start-up” businesses. Meanwhile, Congressional Republicans have continued to hold informal discussions on various Republican-led tax proposals, including through “tax teams” formed by the House Ways and Means Committee.

INFLATION REDUCTION ACT IMPLEMENTATION

The Biden Administration continues to race to implement key provisions of the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) prior to December 2024, and major announcements may be forthcoming. On June 25, the Department of the Treasury and Internal Revenue Service (IRS) published a [final rule](#) in the Federal Register implementing the IRA’s prevailing wage and registered apprenticeship (PWA) requirements for clean energy tax incentives. The final rule contains additional information relating to compliance with and exceptions to the PWA requirements. The final rule took effect on August 26.

On July 18, the Department of the Treasury and the IRS published a [corrected notice of proposed rulemaking](#) (NPRM) on the Section 45Y Clean Electricity Production Credit and Section 48E Clean Electricity Investment Credit. Later, on July 24, the IRS published [initial guidance](#) on the credit for the sequestration of carbon oxide, as amended by the IRA.

On August 16, the Department of the Treasury and IRS published corrections to final rules implementing the IRA’s bonus credit rates for prevailing wage and registered apprenticeship requirements and elective payment provisions. The corrections are available [here](#) and [here](#). On August 22, the Department of the Treasury and IRS published a [correction and correcting amendment](#) to final rules implementing the IRA’s transferability provisions for certain tax incentives.

On August 29, the Department of the Treasury, IRS, and the Department of Energy (DOE) announced the opening of the [full application](#) process for Round 2 of the Qualifying Advanced Energy Project Tax Credit (Section 48C) Program. The IRS encouraged more than 450 projects to apply for \$6 billion in tax credit allocations available under Round 2 of the program. Over 800 total concept papers were received under Round 2, seeking \$40 billion in credits. Applications are due by October 18. DOE, IRS, and Treasury will host a webinar for applicants on September 16.

On August 30, the Department of the Treasury and the IRS issued a [Notice of Proposed Rulemaking](#) (NPRM) for the IRA’s Clean Electricity Low-Income Communities Bonus Credit Program (Section 48E(h)). Comments will be accepted for 30 days following publication in the Federal Register. Treasury will hold a public hearing on the NPRM on October 17, and a Tribal consultation on September 27. More information is available [here](#).

TAX LEGISLATION

Smith-Wyden Tax Package

On August 1, the Senate rejected the *Tax Relief for American Families and Workers Act* ([H.R. 7024](#)), commonly referred to as the Smith-Wyden tax package, in a 48-44 procedural vote amid opposition from Senate Republicans. The \$79 billion bipartisan package, negotiated by Ways and Means Committee Chairman Jason Smith (R-MO) and Senate Finance Committee Chairman Ron Wyden (D-OR), included reinstatement of an expanded Child Tax Credit (CTC) and sought-after extensions of business tax provisions including reinstatement of immediate deductibility of domestic research and development (R&D) expenses, 100-percent bonus depreciation, and full interest deductibility. Of interest to local governments, the package also includes disaster tax relief for recent natural and man-made disasters and modifications to the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) program, including a state housing credit ceiling increase and softened tax-exempt bond financing requirements through 2025. The House of Representatives previously passed the package on January 31, by a 357 to 70 vote.

TECHNOLOGY

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

Executive Activity

During a national cybersecurity conference in early August, Deputy National Security Advisor for Cyber and Emerging Technology Anne Neuberger told reporters that the White House is working on draft legislation to protect U.S.-made AI models from foreign espionage and intellectual property theft. She added that the Administration is preparing an executive order (EO) on cybersecurity, which she anticipates will be one of the final actions taken by the outgoing Biden Administration on technology issues before the end of President Biden's presidency in January 2025.

Ms. Neuberger provided few details about the content of the legislation but warned that "there are countries with very advanced offensive cyber capabilities, and we want to make sure that these models are protected to where they can't be hacked and stolen, they can't be taken by a potential insider." She stated that the White House would seek to attach the final draft bill to a legislative vehicle with a high likelihood of passage this year – but that will only happen with bipartisan Congressional support, the odds of which are currently low, but will depend on the substance of the Administration's proposals.

In addition, on August 29, the U.S. AI Safety Institute (AISII) announced that two leading AI developers, OpenAI and Anthropic, had entered into a voluntary agreement to share model data with the Institute ahead of their public release. Under the agreement, AISII would be permitted to review these models before their public rollout, but it is unclear whether companies will adhere to AISII recommendations given the agreement is voluntary and nonbinding.

Legislative Activity

On August 27, Senator Mike Rounds (R-SD), a member of the bipartisan Senate Artificial Intelligence (AI) Working group, introduced a set of five bills aimed at accelerating the development and regulation of AI in key sectors such as defense, healthcare, and financial services. Unveiled ahead of the Senate's return in September, these bills align with the bipartisan AI policy roadmap released by the Senate AI "Gang of Four" in May.

The package includes the *Unleashing AI Innovation in Financial Services Act* ([S.4951](#)), co-sponsored by Senator Martin Heinrich (D-NM), which proposes the creation of a regulatory “sandbox” to allow financial institutions to experiment with AI projects without facing burdensome regulations or retroactive enforcement. This bill has faced opposition from consumer advocacy groups, which are concerned about potential risks to consumers. The set of bills also includes the *Consumers LEARN AI Act* ([S.4838](#)), which would direct the Secretary of Commerce to develop a national AI literacy strategy, including a media campaign to educate the public on the emerging technology.

Several bills in the package could likely gain traction as attachments to must-pass defense appropriations bills. One piece of legislation that would require the Department of Defense to pilot AI programs for optimization of shipyards and contract administration ([S.4758](#)) has already been incorporated into the base text of the Fiscal Year 2025 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). Two other bills in Sen. Rounds’ package, the *GUIDE AI Act* ([S.4862](#)), which would establish a centralized biomedical data exchange, and the *Increasing AI Transparency in Financial Services Act* ([S.4870](#)), which would mandate reports on gaps in AI regulation within the financial services sector, are expected to be introduced as amendments to the NDAA.

The Senate is aiming to consider the package in September before it breaks for recess ahead of the elections but faces a congested legislative calendar given the looming government funding deadline on September 30. As a result, it is unlikely the Senate floor will vote on these bills before November, but they may move in a “lame duck” session or be attached to a year-end spending package.

Separately, several federal lawmakers have weighed in on a California bill that would regulate the AI industry and seek to mitigate “extreme risks” arising from the emerging technology. Both Reps. Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) and Zoe Lofgren (D-CA) have written to California State Senator Scott Wiener (D), who is the lead sponsor of the legislation, urging him to reconsider the proposal. Federal lawmakers rarely comment on state-level legislation, but in the absence of Congressional action, California AI regulations are expected to form a de facto national standard given the presence on leading developers in the state. Whether these comments will affect the state legislature’s decision making is unclear, but if California does pass the bill, it may motivate Congress to move more rapidly on AI in 2025 to avoid being supplanted by state laws.

DATA PRIVACY

On June 27, the House Committee on Energy and Commerce abruptly canceled a scheduled markup of the American Privacy Rights Act (APRA) ([H.R.8818](#)), moments before the hearing was set to begin. The decision signals that Committee Chair and lead bill sponsor Cathy McMorris Rodgers (R-WA) has accepted that the bill lacks the requisite support to pass the Committee and eventually the House floor in its current form. She had introduced a revised version of the legislation the week prior in preparation for the markup that sought to address the bill’s critics, but the changes ultimately left the legislation facing pressure from both sides of the aisle.

Specifically, the revised draft removed algorithmic accountability provisions, which would have required companies deploying algorithms in consumer products to conduct impact assessments. In addition, the latest draft excluded provisions prohibiting discriminatory uses of data. Democratic Members balked at the move, with Rep. Yvette Clarke (D-NY) telling reporters “Privacy rights are civil rights, and I am very disappointed to see key civil rights protections and algorithmic accountability provisions removed from the recently released draft of [APRA].” Rep. Nanette Barragan (D-CA), who was already skeptical of the legislation due to its preemption mechanisms that would supersede California’s existing data privacy

standards, added “The latest draft only deepens my concerns about the bill because critical civil rights provisions have been removed from the proposal.” Democratic lawmakers were joined by various influential civil rights organizations in opposing the changes.

However, it was not a lack of Democratic support that ultimately sank the bill’s prospects, but rather strong pushback from House Republican leadership, led by House Majority Leader Steve Scalise (R-LA). In a rare rebuke of a committee chair, Leader Scalise and Speaker Johnson met on Wednesday night with Committee Republicans, excluding Chair Rodgers. Reportedly, they told lawmakers that Chair Rodgers had rebuffed outreach from leadership to negotiate the bill and urged their colleagues to vote against it in Committee.

As a result, the APRA is highly unlikely to be enacted this year, and neither Chamber has moved to reconsider the bill. With Chair Rodgers retiring at the end of this term, another Member will have to take up the mantle on federal data privacy standards moving forward, a cause championed by the outgoing Chair.

SEMICONDUCTORS

In recent months, the Biden Administration has announced a series of awards under the CHIPS Act, including: (1) a \$6.7 million grant to Rogue Valley Microdevices for a new fabrication plant in Palm Beach, FL on July 1; (2) a \$400 million grant to GlobalWafers to expand and construct facilities in Sherman, TX, and St. Peters, MO, on July 17; (3) a \$400 million grant and \$200 million loan to Amkor for a new packaging and test facility in Peoria, AZ, on July 24; (4) a \$450 million grant and \$500 million to SK Hynix for a new packaging and research and development (R&D) facility in West Lafayette, IN, on August 6; (5) a \$1.6 billion grant and \$3 billion loan to Texas Instruments for two new fabrication plants in Sherman, TX, and a separate fabrication plant in Lehi, UT; and (6) a \$50 million grant to HP for legacy semiconductor manufacturing in Corvallis, OR.

At this point, nearly all advanced chip manufacturing funds under the CHIPS Act have been allocated, so the Biden Administration is shifting its focus to legacy semiconductors and R&D projects. Though many CHIPS Act projects have faced delays, the Administration remains confident in its efforts to establish a domestic semiconductor ecosystem in the U.S. and will look to continue administering R&D funding through the rest of this year.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS/BROADBAND

BROADBAND EQUITY ACCESS AND DEPLOYMENT PROGRAM

Executive Activity

On August 26, the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) published draft guidance for the use of Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) funding for “alternative technologies.” The \$42.5 billion BEAD program, established under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), seeks to close the U.S. digital divide by investing in broadband development in underserved locations. Though the program primarily targets fiber and other earthbound broadband infrastructure, this new draft guidance is the first time NTIA is expanding funding eligibility to cover satellite and fixed access solutions.

NTIA emphasized that it would continue to prioritize projects involving fiber, which it deemed the “gold standard” for broadband, and “reliable broadband” options, including hybrid fiber/coax networks. However, under the proposed guidance, recognizing that “for a small percentage of locations, in the hardest-to-reach parts of the country, a ‘reliable broadband’ provider will not be available,” NTIA would permit applicants “to fund projects using an alternative technology. Alternative technologies include unlicensed fixed wireless and low-earth orbit (LEO) satellite broadband service that meet the BEAD speed and latency requirements.” These alternative technologies typically have higher upfront costs than do earthbound solutions, so the draft guidance would permit states to seek one-time awards for the installation costs of these networks.

In effect, the draft guidance would be expected to make technologies like SpaceX’s Starlink, a satellite-based broadband network, eligible for BEAD funding. Several states have already begun negotiating with Starlink over deploying its offerings, including Montana and Louisiana. NTIA expressed that its draft guidance would “address the affordability challenges this equipment can pose to adoption and align[] with BEAD funding use for other consumer premise equipment.”

Importantly, NTIA emphasized that alternative technologies would remain a last resort for BEAD investments, which will continue to focus on fiber and other reliable, earthbound broadband options. The guidance would also clarify that applicants can only access BEAD funds for one-time installation costs associated with alternative technologies and that an applicant cannot receive awards for multiple alternative technologies. Further, it would provide details on how states can access BEAD funds for these technologies by explaining application requirements. Public comments on the draft guidance were due September 10.

Legislative Activity

On August 13, Sen. Ted Cruz (R-TX) wrote to Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Communications and Information Alan Davidson, requesting an update on “major administrative delays in the Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) program that have resulted from unlawful red tape imposed by your agency.” He claimed that NTIA has politicized its roll out of BEAD funding and suggested the agency withheld \$849 million from the program to supplement its own budget. Further, he accused NTIA of misusing “its BEAD authorities to impose rate regulation, unionized labor requirements, climate change regulations, technology mandates, and other extralegal policies on the States.”

Sen. Cruz requested that the Assistant Secretary provide a breakdown of administrative funding allocated by NTIA, in addition to a list of each BEAD proposal submitted by states and the status of each proposal.

In the lead-up to the 2024 elections, Congressional Republicans are seeking to undermine the Biden Administration’s record, including on its major legislative accomplishments such as the IJJA. Sen. Cruz has repeatedly warned of wasteful spending under the BEAD program, and lawmakers are likely to continuing pursuing oversight initiatives such as Sen. Cruz’s letter through November.

NET NEUTRALITY

On July 22, the Federal Communications Commission’s (FCC) final rule reinstating net neutrality requirements took effect. The rule prohibits broadband providers from throttling traffic to certain sites by reclassifying broadband as a telecommunications service, which also expands the FCC’s authority to oversee internet networks.

Broadband providers filed legal challenges to the final rule when it was first announced in May, and these cases continue to move through the court system. In June, the Sixth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals was selected to hear the suits, which consists of 16 judges, 10 of whom were appointed by Republican presidents. While the timeline remains unclear, some observers anticipate the case will ultimately be decided by the Supreme Court, though they recognize that if former President Trump retakes the White House next year, the FCC may reverse the final rule and cease defending the changes in court. Regardless, current FCC Chair Jessica Rosenworcel is confident the rule will pass legal scrutiny, telling reporters in July, “I’m really confident in the work we’re doing. I also know that, Democrat or Republican, the FCC often finds itself in court with folks disagreeing with some of our rules, but I think the policies we put in place follow the law and do it well and I’m confident they’ll be upheld.”

TRANSPORTATION/INFRASTRUCTURE

The Administration has continued to implement key programs under the IIJA. Notably, since our last update, DOT awarded \$1.8 billion in awards through the FY 2024 Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) discretionary grant program for 148 projects across the country, as well as: \$1 billion in grants through the FY 2024 Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) program; the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) announced approximately \$1.5 billion in funding through the FY 2024 Bus and Low- and No-Emission Grant; and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) awarded \$1.9 billion through the FY 2024 Airport Improvement Program (AIP).

ELECTRIC VEHICLES

In recent months, the Biden Administration has ramped up implementation of the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Program aimed at expanding EV infrastructure and EV adoption, issued clarifying guidelines for EV buyers, and highlighted customer savings for EV consumers through IRA credits.

On August 14, the Joint Office of Energy and Transportation (Joint Office) and the DOE announced the availability of \$11.2 million through the Innovative Queue Management Solutions (iQMS) for Clean Energy Interconnection and Energization pilot program, created through a partnership intermediary agreement with ENERGYWERX. Application details can be found below. On August 27, the Joint Office announced \$521.19 million through the FY 2022-2023 Round 1B Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Grant Program. Of the total, \$321 million is allocated for 41 projects to expand all types of EV infrastructure, including Level 2 and DC fast chargers in communities, while \$200 million is dedicated to building fast charging projects along designated AFCs.

Throughout the summer, Treasury and the IRS have highlighted customer savings achieved through IRA EV credits and issued updated guidance and FAQs for these tax incentives.

On June 12, Treasury and the IRS highlighted that consumers have “saved more than \$1 billion in upfront costs on their purchase of more than 150,000 clean vehicles since January 1, 2024,” which equates to “around \$262 million [saved] annually on fuel and maintenance costs, and up to \$3.2 billion [saved] in costs over the life of the vehicle.” Specifically, the announcement celebrates the IRA’s 30D Clean Vehicle Credit and 25E Previously Owned Clean Vehicle Credit for incentivizing consumers with an upfront discount through point-of-sale credits. Furthermore, on July 10, Treasury and IRS [published](#) frequently asked questions (FAQs) regarding registration for the Clean Fuel Production Credit. Finally, on July 26, the

IRS [published](#) updated frequently asked questions (FAQs) for the New, Previously Owned, and Qualified Commercial Clean Vehicles Credits.

Notably, however, according to the Spring 2024 Unified Agenda of Regulatory and Deregulatory Actions released on July 5, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) plans to delay its update to NEVI standards and requirements until after the November election. The update is expected to accommodate the predominantly used North American Charging Standard (NACS); current NEVI standards require use of the Combined Charging Standard (CCS). Importantly, this delay means that the FHWA will continue to require the CCS on federally funded chargers until 2025.

Additionally, the Joint Office continues to update resources for states moving toward EV adoption. On August 20, the Joint Office published a white paper titled, “Electric Vehicle Supply Equipment and Considerations for a Reasonable Rate of Return,” which offers tips for states considering EVSE costs and revenue under the NEVI Program. Moreover, the Joint Office updated its Public Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Infrastructure Playbook with four new modules to assist with the planning and build out of zero-emission transportation systems. The updated playbook can be found [here](#).

On September 3, the Architectural and Transportation Barriers Compliance Board issued a notice of proposed rulemaking (NPRM) to amend the accessibility guidelines for buildings and facilities covered by the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) and the Architectural Barriers Act of 1968 (ABA) to specifically address the accessibility of EV charging stations. This proposed rule provides specifications for the accessibility of EV charging stations, to include the EV charger (including physical and communication access), EV charging space, access aisles, and accessible routes. Comments on the NPRM must be received on or before November 4, 2024.

Within Congress, lawmakers continue to examine proposals to facilitate the adoption of EVs. On July 31, the Senate Committee on the Budget held a hearing titled, “Charging Ahead: The Future of Electric Vehicles.” Largely, the hearing covered EVs and identified barriers to the electrification of America’s light-duty fleet, including: 1) the need for reliable and accessible charging infrastructure and grid infrastructure; 2) updating the permitting reform process to promote new and upgraded transmission lines; and 3) promoting investments in domestic supply chains and automakers. Additionally, the hearing reflected bipartisan concerns regarding China’s non-market industrial policies that bolster their EV industry and the need for a new strategy for EV owners to pay into the Federal Highway Trust Fund.

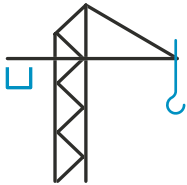
Counties Play an Instrumental Role in the Overall Public Administration and Governance of Federal, State and Local Policies, Programs and Services



Counties own and operate **45 percent** of America's roads and **38 percent** of bridges

America's 3,069 county governments provide essential building blocks for healthy, safe and vibrant communities. Counties invest over \$600 billion each year through the leadership of nearly 40,000 county elected officials and almost 3.6 million county employees. Counties support and maintain key public and community infrastructure, help nurture and sustain a skilled workforce to support dynamic local economies and promote public health and safety to protect our citizens.

NACo supports federal policies and programs that equip county governments with the resources and flexibility needed to serve our residents effectively. NACo works to preserve local decision-making and protect counties from unfunded mandates and preemption of local authority. Since counties implement many federal programs at the local level and must enforce many federal regulations, NACo encourages meaningful intergovernmental consultation with counties throughout all federal policy, program and regulatory development processes.

NACo policy positions are introduced, debated, and voted on by 10 policy steering committees with over 1,400 county officials as well as the NACo Board of Directors and NACo's full membership.

Amplify the Unique County Role in the Intergovernmental System and Federal Policymaking

County governments are instrumental partners in our nation's intergovernmental system, which balances, divides and shares power and responsibilities between all levels of government. Uniquely positioned to implement and administer policies and investments at the local level, NACo supports meaningful and consistent engagement between intergovernmental partners and efforts that recognize and respect the unique roles and responsibilities of counties. Counties support the passage of the Restore the Partnership Act and the Unfunded Mandates Information and Transparency Act. These bills will reduce the regulatory

burden of unfunded federal mandates on the public, increase transparency, foster intergovernmental dialogue and unite all levels of government in supporting our system of federalism.

Similar to the above legislation that recognizes counties as intergovernmental partners, NACo applauds the provisions of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) and the CHIPS and Science Act that designated funds directly to county governments.

Support Bipartisan Direct Federal Investment in Counties

NACo supports legislation that recognizes counties as essential intergovernmental partners through long-term, direct investments in local governments. As owners and operators of a vast amount of the nation's infrastructure, effective implementation of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) will require meaningful and ongoing engagement between officials at all levels of government. Competitive programs that counties are eligible to apply for in the BIL directly must also be fully funded at their authorized levels to ensure successful implementation.

Environmental stewardship is another primary function of county governments to create healthy, safe and vibrant communities for our residents. Counties support the opportunity to pursue clean energy initiatives and reduce emissions through new competitive grant programs and a direct pay option in lieu of clean energy tax credits in the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA).

Furthermore, counties seek to revitalize their economies and foster innovation through the implementation of the RECOMPETE Pilot and Regional Tech Hubs programs in the CHIPS and Science Act.

Maintain Election Integrity and Strengthen Election Worker Safety

In the United States, the nation's 3,069 counties traditionally administer and fund elections at the local level, including overseeing polling places and coordinating poll workers for federal, state and local elections. County election officials work diligently with federal, state and other local election officials to ensure the safety and security of our voting systems. County election officials administer elections in a way that is accurate, safe, secure and accessible for all voters.

Counties oppose legislation that imposes impractical requirements on the election process that adversely affect the conduct of state and local elections. Counties support legislation requiring federal entities to work with local governments to increase cybersecurity in elections and allocate funding directly to counties.

In recent years, the widespread circulation of misinformation and disinformation surrounding the administration of elections has led to a series of new challenges election officials must address, including the increase of targeted threats and harassment toward election officials.

NACo urges Congress to enact legislation that will impose appropriate penalties for offenses related to harassing or intimidating election officials in the performance of their duty and has endorsed the Election Worker Protection Act (S. 1318) led by Sen. Amy Klobuchar (D-Minn.).

Pursue Better Outcomes Within and Across Behavioral Health, Homelessness and Criminal Justice Systems

Counties invest billions each year in systems aimed at improving the health outcomes of residents. Behavioral health programs like the Community Mental Health Services Block Grant and the Substance Use Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery Block Grant exemplify the federal-state and county partnerships that help us keep our communities healthy. Counties use these grants to provide a range of services for adults and children with serious mental illnesses, including employment and housing assistance, case management (including Assertive Community Treatment), school-based support services, family and parenting education and peer support. Congress must fully fund these programs so that counties can continue to leverage these critical tools for mitigating the ongoing mental health crisis.

The federal-state and local partnership by which Medicaid is run serves as a vital tool for enhancing county systems of care and improving healthcare access. Maintaining and strengthening this partnership through federal laws and regulations that acknowledge counties' dual role as administrators and investors in Medicaid enhances the program's integrity and its capacity to serve our nation's most vulnerable citizens. County public health initiatives are bolstered by dedicated, direct and flexible funding. This is why counties advocate for the safeguarding of the Prevention and Public Health Fund, the only federal funding source intended for local public health.

Counties are committed to enhancing health outcomes for justice-involved individuals and endorse policies that eliminate obstacles to care during crucial transition phases. To advance these efforts, Congress must pass federal policies that amend the Medicaid Inmate Exclusion policy and ensure uninterrupted access to federal health benefits for pretrial adults and the immediate reinstatement of health care benefits for adults reentering their community. Programs such as the Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program (JMHCPC) aid counties in mitigating mental illness in jails by promoting inter-system cooperation for screening and treatment-work that can be further supported by fully financing this program at its authorized level for the fiscal year 2024.

Pass a Bipartisan Farm Bill with the Inclusion of County Priorities

The Farm Bill authorizes key programs that help counties make critical investments in infrastructure, economic development, workforce training, nutrition and conservation within some of our nation's most underserved communities. Preserving and expanding these programs is vital to the continued prosperity of both urban and rural counties and the residents we serve. With the current legislation set to expire on Sept. 30, 2024, counties will continue to work with our federal partners to ensure that a five-year, bipartisan Farm Bill that includes key county priorities is signed into law in 2024.

Counties support full funding for all twelve titles of the Farm Bill. For the 70 percent of America's counties, parishes and boroughs considered rural, the Farm Bill represents a significant opportunity to address acute issues unique to rural America. Programs authorized through the bill help counties strengthen rural infrastructure, deliver essential public services to county residents, protect our nation's food supply, increase access to healthy food for low-income

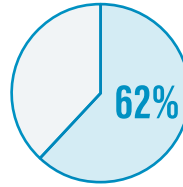
populations through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and empower locally-led environmental stewardship and conservation initiatives.

NACO also supports two additional legislative proposals intended for inclusion in the 2024 Farm Bill. The Treating Tribes and Counties as Good Neighbors Act (S. 697/H.R. 1450) would extend eligibility to counties under the Good Neighbor Authority Program, which would allow them to reinvest receipts gained from authorized restoration projects. The Good Neighbor Authority currently only allows the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Forest Service to work with state forestry agencies. The Rural Partnership and Prosperity Act (S. 3309) would create a competitive grant program to provide multiyear, flexible funding for rural development initiatives, as well as create a grant program to fund technical assistance providers in rural areas and expands the Rural Partners Network, which puts federal staff on the ground in rural communities.

Support Counties with Federal Public Lands by Fully Funding Payments in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) and the Secure Rural Schools (SRS) Program

Counties support maintaining long-term full funding for the Payments in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) program, which compensates public lands counties for untaxable federal land. Without predictable mandatory funding, PILT will remain a discretionary program subject to the annual appropriations process. Public lands counties rely on PILT to provide critical services like infrastructure maintenance, clean water delivery and law enforcement to residents and visitors alike. Counties urge the administration and members of Congress to support long-term, predictable full funding for PILT in 2024 and beyond and modifying the program to make PILT payments to counties with smaller populations more equitable. Counties also support extending the Secure Rural Schools (SRS) program as a transitional funding mechanism until the federal government fully implements a sustainable, long-term forest management program with adequate revenue sharing for forest counties and schools. NACo supports legislation such as the Secure Rural Schools Reauthorization Act of 2023 that provides forest revenue-sharing payments to counties and promotes active natural resource management.

NACo will continue to urge leadership in both chambers and on both sides of the aisle to work together to enact a long-term, sustainable solution to ensure stable revenue sources to national forest counties. Furthermore, counties support legislation and policies which would ensure federal land management agencies aggressively reduce the excess

wildfire fuels on the entire National Forest System. The annual average number of acres burned has grown dramatically from 3.3 million acres per year in the 1990s, to 7 million annually since the year 2000. Counties support legislation for financing the suppression of catastrophic wildland fires without borrowing from other agency accounts for active management for forest and rangeland health and post-fire restoration and mitigation. Counties oppose any attempt to shift the costs of wildland fire suppression from federal agencies to counties.

Promote County Priorities and Local Decision-Making in Federal Rulemaking Around Land Use, Environmental Quality, and Energy Development

Counties support federal policies that balance environmental, public health and safety and local economic needs. As both regulators and regulated entities, counties are responsible for protecting local air, water and land resources through delegated authority under state and federal laws. For example, counties spend \$23 billion on sewerage and solid waste management per year. Federal regulations and guidelines are more effective if they are clear, understandable and can be easily administered at the local level.

As the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and other federal agencies move forward with future rulemaking, NACo supports further federal investments and consistent and meaningful engagement with local government officials. Counties additionally support increased federal funding to support the successful implementation of future rulemakings. Counties urge the EPA to continue to hold meaningful consultation with local governments early in the rulemaking process to reduce the risk of unfunded mandates and other unintended consequences caused by implementing federal policy.



Strengthen Community Resilience Through Enhanced Federal, State and County Partnerships for Disaster Preparedness, Response and Recovery

Counties engage in all aspects of emergency management, including planning, preparation, mitigation, response and recovery. As the frequency and costs of disasters increase, counties urge Congress and the administration to provide increased federal resources to counties so they can continue to protect our residents, property, infrastructure systems and local economies.

Counties support reforms to FEMA's Public Assistance Program to ensure expedited reimbursement for communities following a disaster.

Counties call on Congress to pass long-term reauthorization and reform legislation for the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) to improve affordability, mitigation assistance, flood risk mapping and program administration. The program aims to reduce the impact of flooding on private and public structures by providing affordable insurance to property owners and by encouraging communities to adopt and enforce floodplain management regulations.

Furthermore, counties support increased funding for the Emergency Management Grant Program and other mitigation grants to support local hazard mitigation and preparedness.

Local Flexibility to Support Economic Mobility

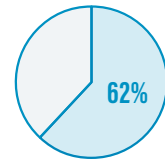
Counties are key players in crafting long-term economic development strategies, implementing local policies that support labor market recovery and facilitating public-private partnerships that foster innovation. We support federal programs and investments that help counties address our unique local economic challenges, reduce unemployment and create sustained economic opportunity.

Counties support increased funding for the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) that assists urban, suburban and rural communities in improving housing and living conditions and expanding economic opportunities for low- and moderate-income residents. CDBG helps create jobs by expanding and retaining businesses and is an essential tool for helping local governments tackle serious challenges facing our communities.

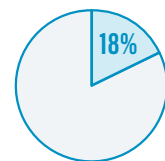
Counties also support reauthorization legislation of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) that preserves local governance authority, while promoting innovation and flexibility to respond to local emerging economic realities and business needs.

Counties are integral partners in providing services and supports that stabilize vulnerable households

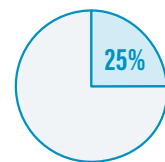
NACo supports expanded resources and flexibilities in federal assistance programs that combat intergenerational poverty, promote safe and stable families, strengthen early childhood systems and help older adults live independently in their communities. Counties support structural changes to the Child Tax Credit to increase the number of eligible households and provide higher benefit amounts, increased funding and flexibility for child welfare programs, and increased investments in the child care system to ensure families can access affordable, high-quality care while engaging in the workforce. Counties also call for a substantive reauthorization of the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program that preserves key programmatic flexibility while expanding the ability of county human services agencies to support families in their journeys to well-being and self-sufficiency.

Deploy High-Speed Internet that is Affordable, Reliable, and Accessible While Preserving Local Decision Making, Partnerships and Innovation

The Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) program, administered by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA), offers a historic opportunity to connect all unserved and underserved residents to high-speed internet. The BEAD program's success depends on robust local coordination, and counties are uniquely positioned to contribute to their state's challenge process, and planning process to ensure that BEAD funds are successful in significantly reducing barriers to broadband access.



With help from counties, **over 23 million households** are now enrolled in the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) since its inception in January 2021, which is approximately **30 percent of eligible households**. Counties are now advocating to continue congressional funding for the ACP to ensure the program does not lapse.



Less than 40 percent of locations in the country have access to fiber-based high-speed internet, measured at 100/20 Mbps, with the problem exacerbated in rural and hard-to-build regions. Counties are prioritizing the deployment of future-proof broadband technology to ensure residents can benefit from long-term access to high-quality broadband services.



Counties across the country have begun adoption of **model digital equity policy frameworks** to ensure all of their residents can benefit from access to high-speed internet.

The report also contains projects included on certain approved lists associated with specific appropriations where the list may be referenced in proviso but the project is not specifically listed. Examples of the lists include, but are not limited to, the library, cultural, and historic preservation program grants included in the Department of State, as well as the Beach Management Funding Assistance Program and the Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program included in the Department of Environmental Protection. The Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP) and funds distributed to counties by state agencies at a later date are not identified in this report.

Items in this report considered Appropriations Projects under Joint Rule Two are identified with either a House Form (HF) number or a Senate Form (SF) number in the Project Title or the term "RBAP" is included under the program description to indicate the item includes recurring base appropriations project (RBAP) funding. If the RBAP received additional nonrecurring funding in the GAA, the total provided includes the recurring base plus the additional nonrecurring funding.

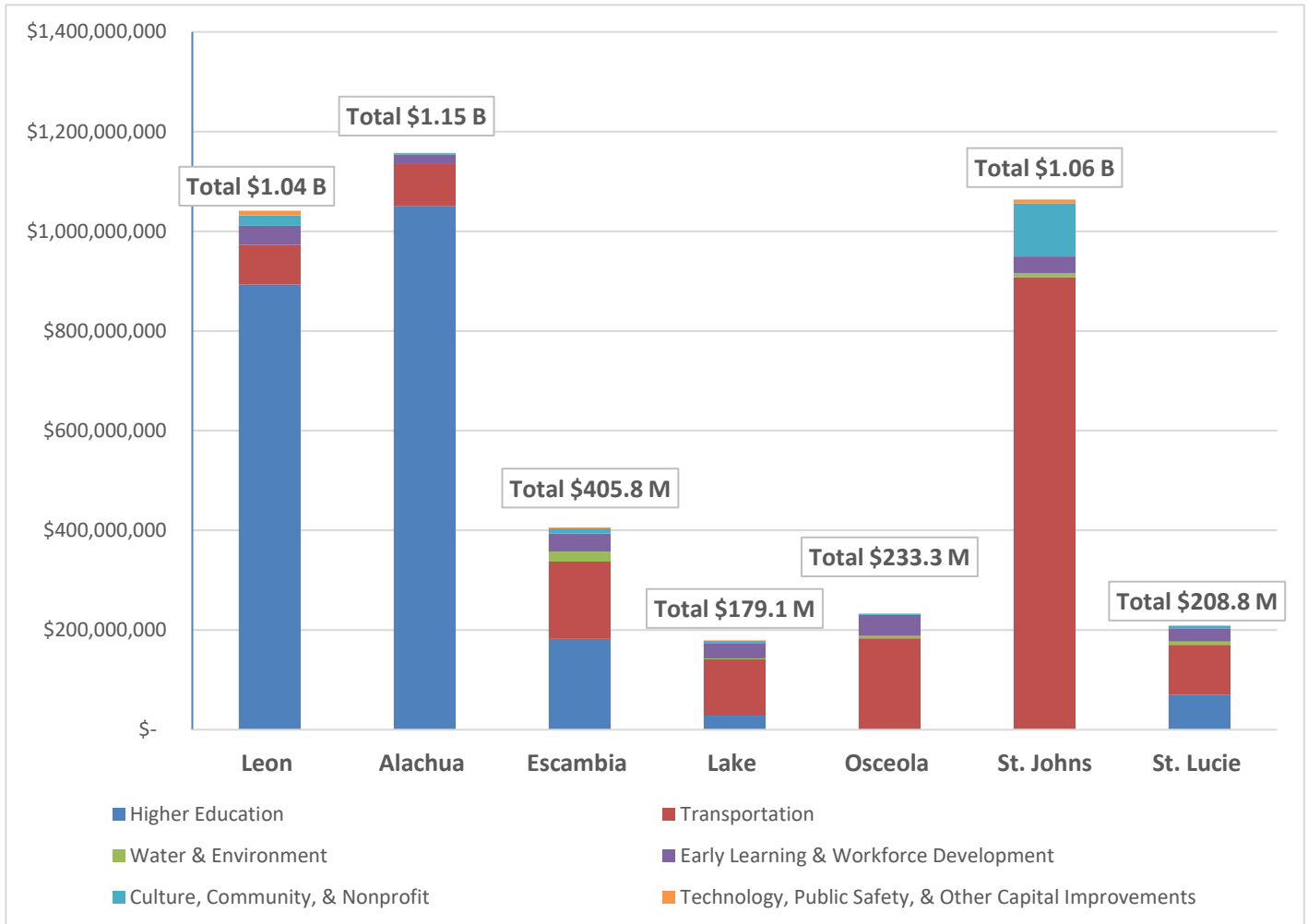

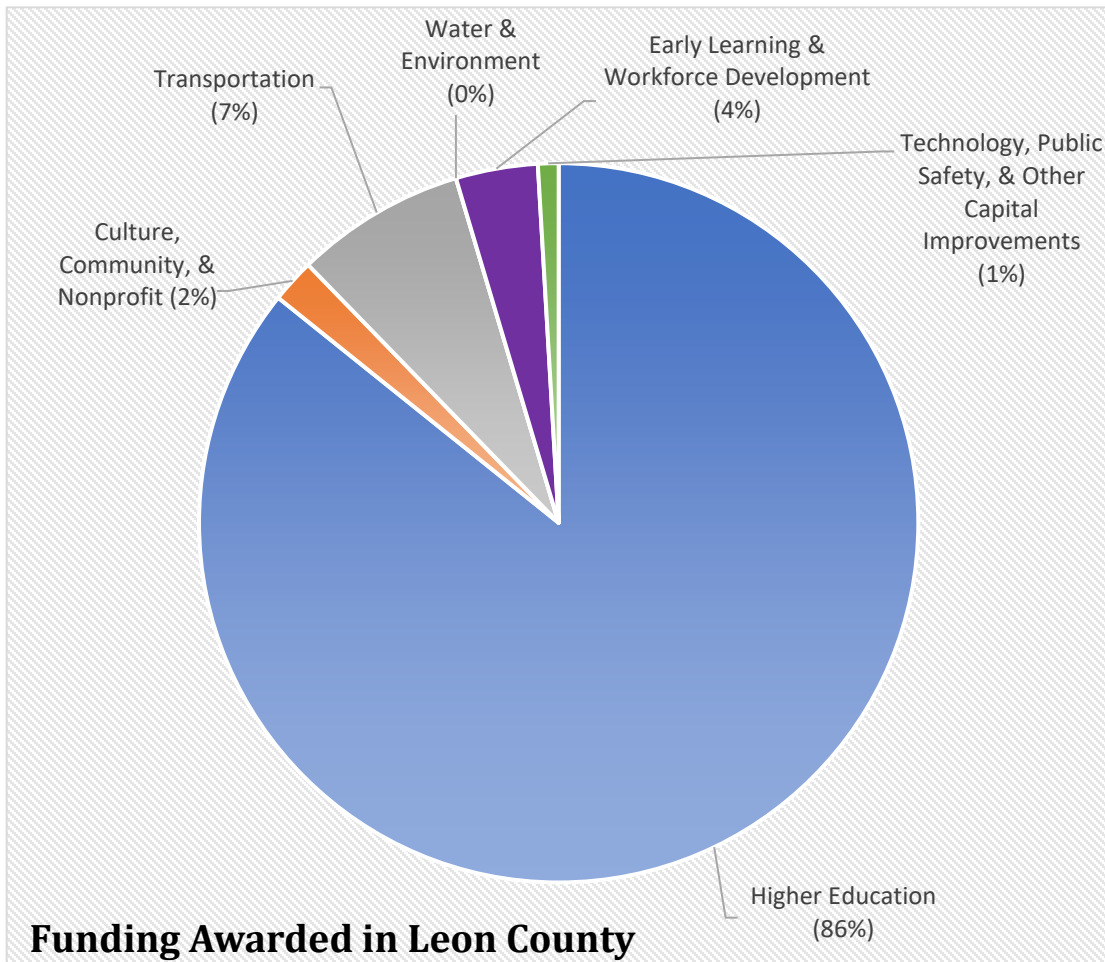

Total Funding Awarded in Final FY 2025 Budget – Like-Sized County Comparison



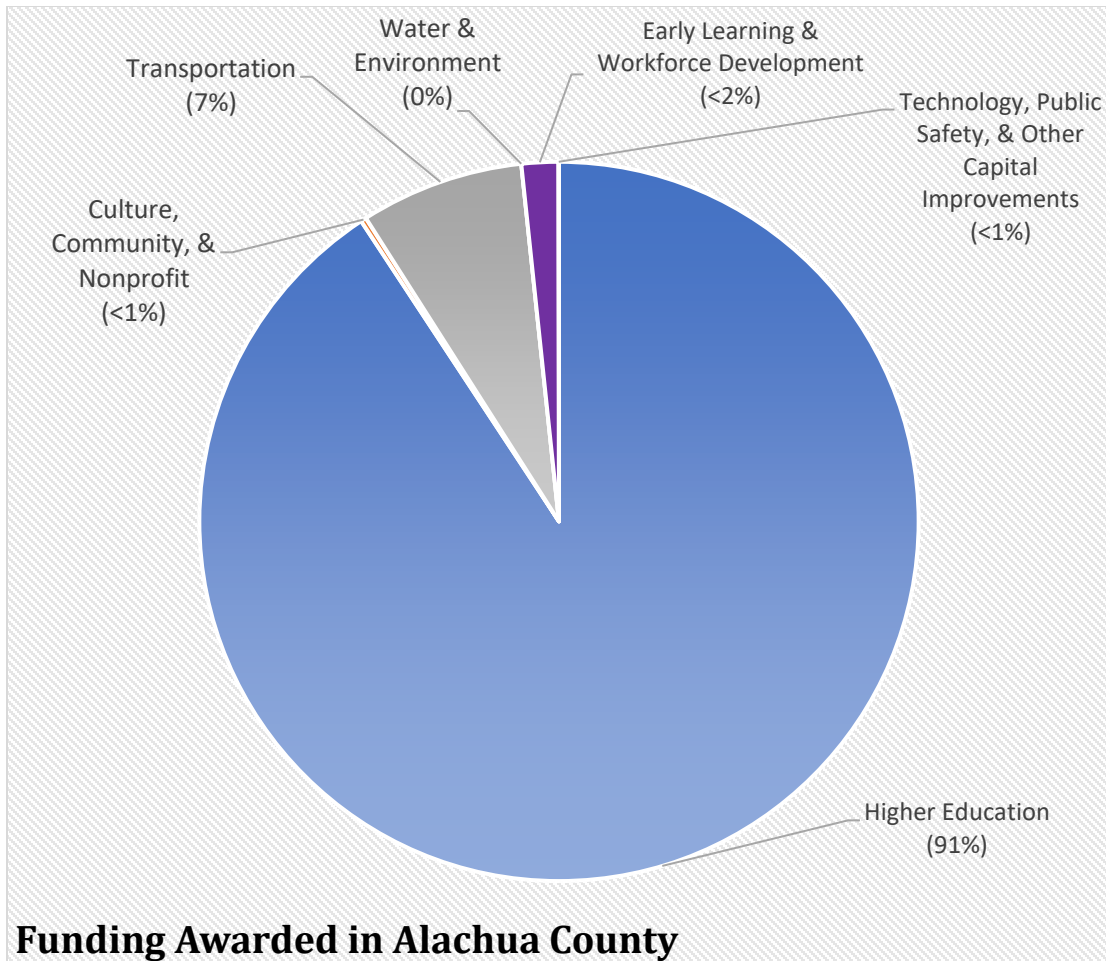

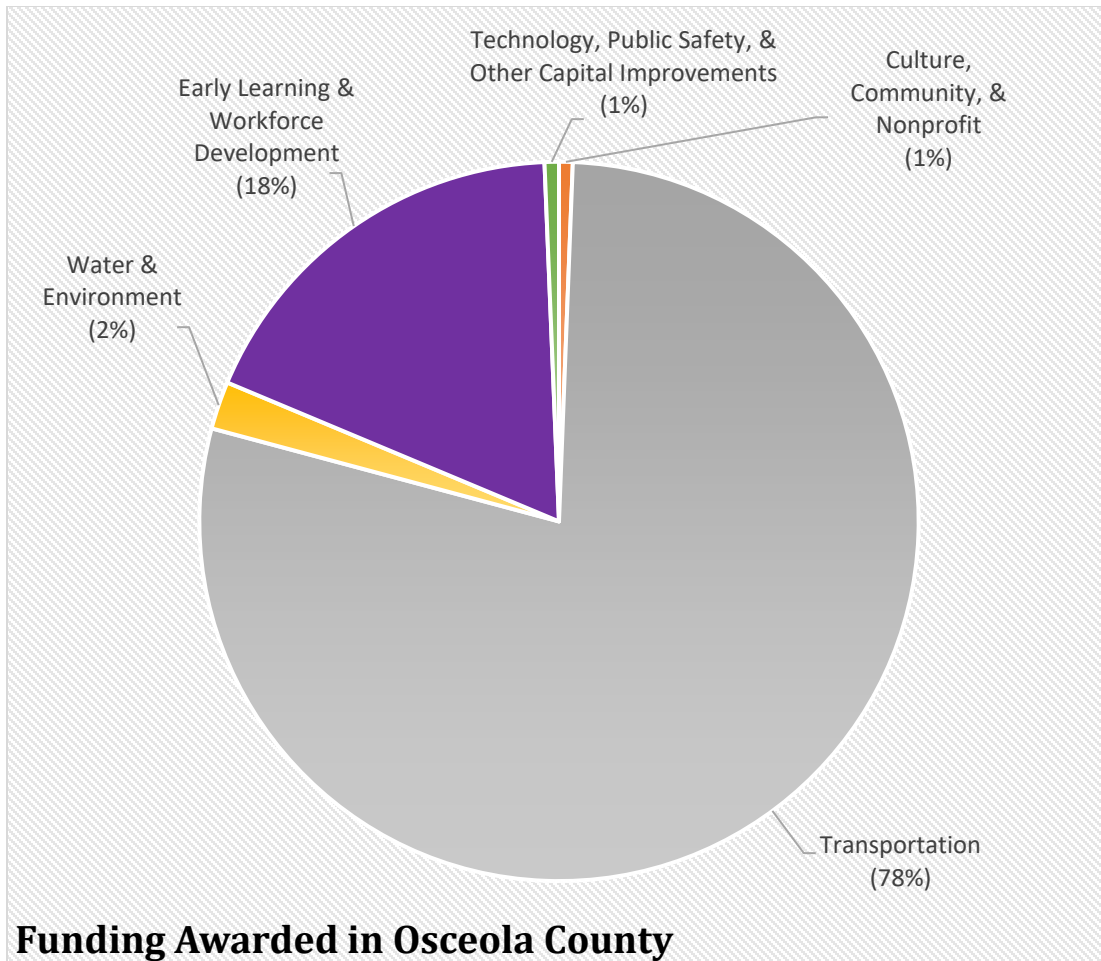
