Under the County's new organizational structure, the Office of Intervention and Detention Alternatives was created to align all jail management activities under one office. Probation, Supervised Pre-Trial Release, and Drug and Alcohol Testing programs have been realigned under this new office. Intervention and Detention Alternatives is dedicated to restoring and enhancing the quality of life of the clients it serves, assisting them in becoming productive and responsible citizens for a safer community.

Intervention and Detention Alternatives serves as the liaison with the State Attorney, Public Defender, law enforcement, and the Courts and also partners with these entities to hold such events as the Fugitive Safe Surrender Event.

The Office Intervention and Detention Alternatives director, Wanda Hunter-Donaldson, has been a Leon County employee for more than two decades. She is a member of the American Probation and Parole Association and has served on the Board of Directors of the Florida Association of Pretrial Professionals of Florida. Hunter-Donaldson has also been recognized by the National Forum for Black Public Administrators for outstanding service in Law Enforcement and Public Service.

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COURT SERVICES, CASE MANAGEMENT & COMMUNITY SERVICE

- Leon County through the Office of Intervention and Detention
 Alternatives is dedicated to assisting its clients and in
 making them productive and responsible citizens for a safer
 community while providing information to the Courts to
 properly dispose of cases in a timely manner, thereby ensuring
 the smooth and efficient operation of the Criminal Justice
 System:
 - » Probation office maintains a monthly average caseload of 1,500 offenders with court ordered conditions of sentence.
 - » Completed more than 6,300 offender assessments and documented criminal history summaries in preparation for First Appearance judicial review and consideration for pretrial release.
 - » Monitored an average of 519 offenders each month.
 - » Successfully monitored 51 offenders with court ordered mental health conditions. All cases were closed successfully and no offenders were required to return to jail during this period.
- At the request of the Judiciary, Leon County developed the Drug and Alcohol Testing Program in order to ensure proper quality control. The division performs more than 700 alcohol tests and more than 900 drug tests each month.
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Did You Know

Leon County's Work Program used 1,800 offenders with court ordered sentences to work on roadway, greenway, park and facilities maintenance and general public service.

- As public safety is one of the critical responsibilities of county government, Leon County continues to focus on jail population management and recidivism issues in cooperation with the Public Safety Coordination Council. This council consists of representatives from law enforcement, state attorney, public defender, judiciary, and county commission. Intervention and Detention Alternatives is responsible for staffing this council.
- Partnerships are critical in addressing jail population
 management and recidivism issues in our community. The
 Fugitive Safe Surrender Event held in December 2010
 was designed to encourage individuals with outstanding
 misdemeanor warrants to surrender in a safe manner. This
 event was a collaboration between community leaders and
 representatives from Bethel AME Church, the U.S. Marshall's
