Leon County recognizes community for being #HurricaneStrong in the face of Michael

Leon County Government, in coordination with the City of Tallahassee, Leon County Sheriff's Office, and many nonprofit partners throughout the community, would like to thank citizens and agencies for being prepared and resilient in the face of Hurricane Michael.

An historic Atlantic storm Hurricane Michael swept through our community as a strong Category 4 hurricane that had maximum sustained winds of 155 mph when it

made landfall, just 2 mph shy of Category 5 status. Hurricane Michael made the ommunity prepare, act, and recover. Leon County and the City of see distributed more than 125,000 sand bags, cleared many downed trees, and stayed in constant communication during the disaster while sheltering 1,600 evacuees and local residents. More than 8.113 truckloads of debris have been collected from residents and businesses, now exceeding 110,875 tons. With the increased amounts of rain, we encourage you to take the necessary precautions to reduce the amount of contact with mosquitoes. The best way to prevent mosquito-borne diseases is to stop mosquitoes from living and multiplying around your home or business.

Protect yourself and your family with these easy steps:

- · Drain standing water to stop mosquitoes from multiplying. Cover your skin with clothing and use EPA approved mosquito repellent.
- Cover doors and windows with screens to keep mosquitoes out.
